Be Frank, Long Shot, Wins Latonia Derby

Latonia, Ky., June 7.—Be Frank, a black colt, by Sir Johnson-Frankness, owned by C. M. Garrison, and ridden by C. Kummer, one of two eastern representatives in the race, won the rich Latonia Derby, worth \$10,000, on Saturday here today, by three lengths.

Omond, owned by M. Quinn, was second, a half length in front of Regalo, from the stable of Gallaher Bros. The mile and a half was run in 2:37 3-4, which was good time for the race considering the condition of the track, which was about three pounds slow.

Be Frank, carried 113 pounds, and was the lead at the mile and was quarter, displaying a second place to the horses up to that distance. Com- mon was second, Omond came up, and challenged Be Frank and Regalo, the others being closely bunched.

Omond continued to lead, but Be Frank's lead and took second place from Regalo. Regalo made a bid for the place close to the finish, but Omond outlasted him and finished a half length in front of him. Vulcanite finished fourth.

The others finished as follows: Clermont, Eternel, Pastoreau and St. Bernard. In capturing second place, Omond won for his owners \$2,000; Regalo \$1,000; Be Frank \$500; Vulcanite won \$200. It was estimated that the race was the largest crowds that were ever at Latonia.

CORN TASSEL WINS SUBURBAN HANDICAP

Defeating Sweep On, by a Nose With the Ross Horse, Bonfire, Third.

New York, June 7.—At Belmont Park race course today, over a track that was lightning fast, R. G. Wilson's five-year-old gelding Corn Tassel, by Santol-Cornfield, won the classic Suburban at one mile and a quarter. The value of the stake was \$5,200 and the gelding star of the day.

The race was a fine display of correct breeding and training. Corn Tassel, a 3-year-old colt Sweep On, with Commander J. K. L. Ross Bonfire three lengths and a half away. The gelding's time, 2:02 1-5, is really a record for this race as the official time of 2:00 has been credited to Whisk Broom II, when he won this event in 1915, was not generally accepted as being correct.
