## Toronto Hockey League Will Fight for the Rinks

The Toronto Hockey League, the largest outdoor organization in the world, held an important meeting last night, when every member of the executive was present, also delegates from over 100 clubs. The meeting was the most important in the league's career, as the league decided unanimously on legal advice, that the Toronto Amateur Hockey Association could not control the city outdoor rinks, and decided to fight same for the citizens' rights. The following resolution was adopted:

"That at a meeting of the executive of the Toronto Hockey League, we deprecate the action of the parks commission in proposing to have the municipal hockey cushions put under the control of an organization recently formed and known as the Toronto Amateur Hockey Association, which is not representative of the entire hockey organizations in the city. That the Toronto Hockey League, being the largest body and having controlled outdoor hockey successfully for the past 11 years, should not be compelled to be put under the ban of an association which in reality is scarcely organized and not representative to control the sport. That by the resolution at the annual meeting of the Toronto Hockey League held recently it was, by a vote of the representatives of over 100 clubs, decided not to recognize such an organization, for at least this year, and that any action taken in connection with the affiliation would have to come before the annual meeting of the league, which will not be held for another 12 months. Further resolved that all members of clubs being composed of taxpayers and sons of taxpayers have an equal right to use the municipal hockey cushions. And further that it is contrary to law and city to delegate their powers to any body whatsoever to keep players off the rinks supported by the funds of the taxpayers, and that the best interests of hockey are served by all boys and small clubs not affiliated with any league having the privilege of using the city hockey cushions.
