in 1906 and again this year humbled the pride of the English rowing world thus meets the same fate which befell Edward Hanlan Ten Eyck, who some years ago won the Diamond Sculls and was not permitted to return.

Regarding English rowing matters, Captain Frank Beddington writes The New York Herald as follows:

"No foreign entries are to be accepted at the next Henley regatta on account of the Olympic games, the regatta taking later. This resolution was passed by the Henley regatta.

"The Belgians, in consequence, will not be able to defend the Grand Challenge Cup, which they now hold. They are the first foreign crew to win it. They have won it twice in succession.

"That they are not to be allowed to compete is exciting widespread comment. Sportsmen generally regret that the exception cannot be made. Certainly it does not seem fair that the holders of the cup, unless disqualified, should not have the right to defend their title to it. In some circles the non-existence of a central governing body in a position to dictate to the Henley stewards is deplored.

"English crews are already trying to imitate the style of the Belgians. A shorter and more lively stroke is being taught. Swivel rowlocks, the use of which on eights I have so long advocated, have now been adopted by the First Trinity Cambridge."


