LOOKS LIKE THE RIGHT MEN  
CASHIER CAULEY IDENTIFIED HIM  
ASSAILANTS.  
He says positively that Mike Horn and Mark Tompkins are the two men who took from him \$1100 of Mayor Tuckett's money—St. James' Evidence Produced—Committed for Trial.  
Hamilton, March 2.—(Special)—There are good prospects for Mike Horn and Mark Tompkins, the two men charged with committing one of the boldest robberies ever committed in Canada. Clubbing Mayor Tuckett's cashier and robbing him of \$1100 in broad daylight, spending a few hours in the province, they appeared before Judge Jelfs this morning, and after a portion of the damaging evidence had been introduced, they were committed for trial. They having pleaded not guilty and elected to go to trial, the judge, Cashier Cauley, the cashier, looking pale and weak, told of drawing \$1430.15 from the British North America Bank, leaving \$280.15 in the clear, and then proceeding to the tobacco factory on Queen-street, turning onto Queen from York-street, and walking down a short main walk from the alleyway near the factory, onto Queen-street, and proceeded towards him, taking the outside and the other the inside of the sidewalk. He knew the men, and claims to have been looking at them when he put out his right hand, trying to pass between the fence and the shelter as he looked and saw the taller man with a big club over his head.  
The prisoners identified him. He was knocked unconscious, and knew nothing further of the affair, but pointing to the prisoners positively identified them the men, giving a description of the hat the taller one wore, answering to the one found in the barn, into which two men were seen running.  
The prisoners were committed for trial from Mrs. Lyons' house about 12.40 the day of the robbery; W. Condon, proprietor of the Thompson House, Market-street, about 1.15 that day, and as W. McDonald, 25 King-street, near Park, the prisoners passed them, Tompkins remarking: "Give it to me to the good end."

The public school estimates for 1896 have been struck at \$422,965. The sum was decided on after a session of the Finance Committee of the board yesterday evening lasting six hours.

The principal debate was on the salary question. At present teachers receive a yearly advance in accordance with the length of their service. Chairman Douglas wished to establish a new basis by which all teachers would be scheduled in accordance with the grade of classes they taught and the number of rooms which a principal was responsible for. It was finally decided to leave the matter to the committee.

Mr. J. W. McPherson has a motion to pay teachers in order of merit instead of length of service, which will be considered later in the year.

On motion of Mr. W. S. Lee, the committee was authorized to investigate the salary of the caretaker, the salaries paid to the janitors, and the salaries of officials and \$13,762 for caretakers.

A WESTON HOLD-UP.  
The Robber Nabbed at the Junction—A Bad Man From the Other Side.  
Toronto Junction, March 2.—Suburban towns and villages seem just now to be the favorite stamping-ground of thieves. Late this evening a young man named Weston, aged 44, dressed in a dark suit and wearing a top hat, entered Irwin's drug store at Weston and bought a small package of cough-candy. As Clerk Watson turned from him, Weston made a dash for the door and was followed by the clerk. He was found himself "covered" by a revolver in the hands of his customer, who demanded the money in his bill. Having, as he thought, terrified Watson into submission, the robber proceeded to go through the till. The clerk, as soon as the revolver was pointed another way, bethought him of resistance, but on his first movement he was seized by the ruffian and half-choked. The cash which was in the till, amounting to \$7, was abstracted, and the thief boarded a Junction trolley car.  
Watson secured a rig and chased the car. Upon overtaking it the motorist was notified the doors of the car were secured and the car proceeded to the Junction. Watson driving ahead, notified the police. At Peacock's Hotel P. C. Graham was met. He boarded the car, secured the robber and handcuffed him at the point of a revolver.  
The prisoner, who said his name was Ed Williams, denied any knowledge of the robbery, but the officers, on searching him, found a revolver, the exact sum stolen from Irwin's in the stolen papers which had been in the till, and a general impression that he was an American importation.  
He was ejected from a train near Weston shortly before the robbery.

REF. W. G. SANDERSON DEAD.

Toronto, March 2.—Rev. W. G. Sanderson of Angus, son of Rev. J. T. Sanderson of this town, died here at 11 o'clock this morning. He attended the Epworth League convention at Toronto and came to town on Friday at midnight. He looked suddenly ill on Saturday night, and all efforts to save his life seemed utterly futile. He has been married two years. The family are stricken by this sad and sudden bereavement.
