Buckley and Other Convicts Made a Boid Attempt to Escape From the Kingston Pentientiary.

Kingston, Sept 19.-Five men are in dungeon cells in Kingston Penitentiary for having been engaged in a plot to secure liberty. They had tunnelled from their cells in the prison of isolation into an unoccupied cell, and with saw knives had cut the bars of with saw knives had cut the bars of the iron door. RUMORS ONLY.

In October, 1888. Buckley was charged with having murdered in May of that year, Bertha Usher, his mistress, but was convicted of manslaughter and sentenced to five years in the penitentiary. The Crown having neglected to file previous convictions in the trial, applied for a longer sentence, and the application was granted by Justice Galt. It was found on examination of the records that the accused had been convicted from 1873 up to that date on 19 different charges, varying from drunkenness to burglary and keeping a disorderly house. varying from drunkenness to burg-lary and keeping a disorderly house. Taking this into consideration, the judge extended the sentence from five to fifteen years.

STORM ON LAKE SUPERIOR

mer Alaska Lost Her Headway Fell Into the Trough of the Sea and Was Roughly Buffeted.

Marquette, Mich., Sept. 19.-Terrific ompanied by snow and hail. is from the northwest, and as there was little warning of its approach considerable anxiety is felt for the safety of much shipping caught out on the lake. When off Big Bay Point in the storm last night a steam pipe on the steamer Alaska burst. Nothing could be done to repair it until the steam was exhausted. The vessel lost her headway, fell into the trough of the sea and experienced the roughest handling in her history, as a terrible sea was runing. The entire cargo between decks, consisting chiefly of paving cement, coccanut oil, molasses and patent medicines, was runed, filling the deck with a thick, viscid mixture. The machinery was slightly damaged by the breaking of small pipes and connecting rods. The bulwarks were knocked out by the rolling barrels of cement, and the forward rail had to be cut away in order to drop the starboard anchor while lying to to repair the burst pipe.

Several disasters resulted from the storm and vesselmen and passengers were badly scared, but no lives were lost.
