Business in Buttontown Yesterday Forenoon.

**THE TELEGRAPH MEN TESTIFIED**

Berlin, Sept. 21.—The trial of the North Waterloo election petition was resumed here this morning at 11.30 o'clock, before their Lordships Justices Osler and Meredith. The judges and counsel came up from Toronto on the morning train and were driven to the court house immediately upon their arrival. Messrs. W. D. McPherson, Edmund Bristol and W. M. Read appearing for the petitioners and Messrs. A. B. Aylesworth, J. C. C. and W. McDonald for the respondent.

Upon the opening of the court Mr. McPherson announced the intention of proceeding with the agency of Albert Boscawen, but did not wish it understood that the Boscawen charges were concluded.
