WOULD COST \$21 A DAY TO CLEAR
AND SCRAPE WATER FILTERS

(Continued From Page One.)

them, Mr. Allen Hazen, who is a recognized expert on this class of work; yet the fact remains that the death rate in Washington, according to the proceedings and discussions which took place before American Society of Civil Engineers during the year 1906, shows an increase after the filters were completed, and this has been considered such a serious matter that if you will refer to the Engineering Record of April 13, 1907, you will note an article in which it states that the present filters do not solve the water purification problem, and that they are, therefore, going to carry out some further experiments in order to endeavor to obtain satisfactory results.

Many Dangers.

It is a known fact, and admitted by all filtration experts, that unless sand filtration is very scientifically carried on, which means the constant services of experts, that the results will be a material variation, and while it is true that some tests, when the plants are entirely new, have been made, showing the removal of as high as 98 per cent of the bacteria, this rate has uniformly been increased considerably after the plants have been in operation. I would recommend that the board obtain a copy of the proceedings of the American Society of Civil Engineers of December, 1906, in which they will find complete discussion and proof of the attitude I have taken in regard to the filtration.

Says Maury Was Unfair.

In regard to the comparison of cost, it is very evident that Mr. Maury attempted to distort the figures of my proposition. My proposition provides for the financing of my plant, the idea being that I should receive pay for water delivered, which, as you are selling at a considerable profit, there would be no fixed charges of any nature, as far as I can determine on the plant.

Mr. Maury also deducts from my figures the amount of \$40,000, being the estimated cost of pumping with the filtration system for a period of five years, during the time when I would propose to operate my plant. I would like to know how he arrives at the figures of \$8,000 a year, when, by the report of the water committee of 1906, it shows that for the fiscal year, the disbursements for the pumphouse maintenance was \$8,458.90, and that during that time the pumping was carried on at the rate of about 3,500,000 gallons daily. It also shows that about one-third of the water was pumped by steam during that period. Therefore, the coal item was an inconsiderable one. Now, if I understand Mr. Maury's proposition of either using producer engines or steam engines, the whole cost of the increased supply will be pumped in this way. Therefore, it certainly would not cost any less per million than the present rate, and, naturally, would exceed it.

Cost of Cleaning.

In addition to this, I do not see any item for operating this filtration plant. The cost of cleaning and the removal of sand, and the scraping of the filters, based on actual figures compiled from a number of places, both in this country and abroad, is generally estimated at from \$7.10 to \$7.25 per million gallons, or from \$7.10 to \$7.25 per day. I am prepared to substantiate all of these points, but I would suggest, if there is any doubt as to these statements, that the board appoint a committee and let them go to Washington, D. C., Albany, N. Y., and Philadelphia, Pa., and let them satisfy themselves as to the cost of operation and percentage of bacteria removed. I feel that the cost of installation, which I feel is greatly underestimated in Mr. Maury's report, and determine for themselves as to the relative advantages of my proposition and the one advocated by Mr. Maury.

City Daren't Do It.

Mr. Maury lays great stress on the fact that, without pumping any unfiltered water, he can readily increase his supply to six million gallons per day. My proposition also provides for the same capacity. He goes on further to say that in case of fire, he could pump nine millions by taking in river water, unfiltered. I hardly think that any board of health would
