Mrs. Macfie, mother of the bride,

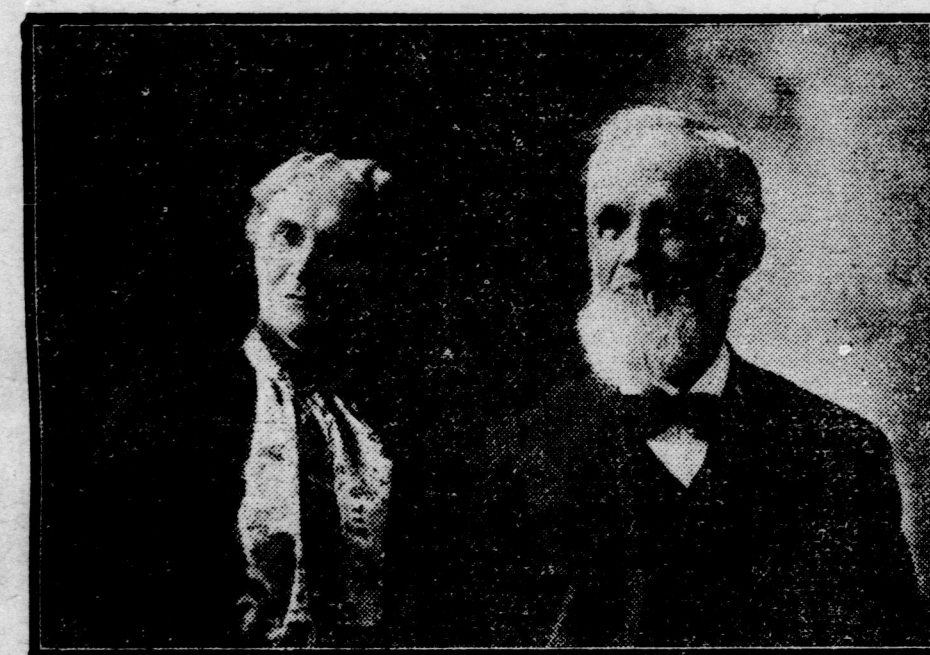

POST CARD CRAZE IN LONDON

To send a representative to Germany and other postcard centers at intervals of about four months during the year to re-stock and introduce a new line of goods to the people of Canada. The sales of one postcard dealer in Toronto during the exhibition averaged fifteen thousand cards per day.

Prices of Cards. The postcards might be classified as follows: Local and foreign views, Easter, Christmas, Valentine, New Year's, fancy, embossed, comic and many others too numerous to mention.

In order to make a first-class postcard it is necessary to have a photograph at least as large as the postcard. The larger the better for the detail of the view. The prices of picture postcards have a wide range. The cheapest can be obtained for \$3.50 per thousand, and they range from that price to \$250 per thousand. The stock used in the different cards is leather, cardboard, plush and silk.

One of the main advantages of the picture postcards is the broadening of ideas by coming in constant contact with them.

In fact the industry has come to about where anyone can get a card to express mostly any thought that he might wish to express by mail.

Grace Cameron and Al. Laurence Made Big Hit at the Grand.

Pretty, petite, Grace Cameron sang so successfully in "Puff, Puff, Puff," "When Dolly Dimples Made a Hit," that she was taken out of the production, and another production, "Dolly Dimples," was written around her.

In looking for a co-star, Mr. C. H. Kerr, the proprietor and manager, was very fortunate, for he secured the services of that prince of good fellows, Al. Laurence, well known to Londoners as a monologist of the first water.

Last night Grace Cameron and Al. Laurence appeared at the Grand in

"Dolly Dimples," and a packed house applauded their work for three hours.

"Dolly Dimples" is a musical comedy story. From the rise to the fall of the curtain, there is something doing. It sparkles with witty lines, melodious tones, and laugh-provoking actions. It is a conglomeration of "The Show Girl," with a strong strain of vaudeville, and a little of everything that is good in wit, humor and song. Its staging is magnificent, and on the whole, it is one of the most satisfactory musical melanges produced at the Grand for many months.

His rube dialect is excellent, and his deliveries are splendid. He knows what to do in any situation, and that is to make people laugh. He was applauded repeatedly last night, and it is safe to say that his reputation as a star in America is no passing glorifier. Al's there with the goods every minute.

At the close of the show he rung in his famous monologue, and the crowd laughed itself to the verge of a fit. For a time it appeared as though the audience meant to sit up all night with him.

The choruses were very praiseworthy, the numbers being rendered in a finished manner. The specialties, of which there were a number, were much better than the ordinary, especially the musical turns.
