WOMEN WILL HELP RAISE \$300,000 FOR PATRIOTIC PURPOSES

Accept Share of Responsibility in Big Campaign.

COMMITTEES ARE NAMED
Three Hundred Volunteers To Go Into the Homes of London.

Plans for the patriotic fund campaign were laid before a representative gathering of London women yesterday afternoon in Gwyn Hall at a meeting called for the purpose of enlisting their co-operation in the grand three-days' canvass of this month.

Col. A. M. Smith, chairman of the special committee appointed to approach the women's organizations on the subject, presided, and business was conducted by Sir George G. Gibbons, K.C., and Chairman A. E. Silverwood of the campaign committee, and Rev. Dr. Tucker, rector of St. Paul's Cathedral.

Sir George G. Gibbons urged the necessity for continuing and increasing patriotic effort. In the present campaign the object is to raise \$300,000 for patriotic purposes. The success of the campaign, he declared, will depend upon making every man, woman, and child in the city feel a responsibility towards it. It is a campaign reaching every individual, and enlisting the aid of all contributors in proportion to their means.

Help All You Can.
"The general committee is trying to be just and fair to all. We are asking anyone to give too much. We are asking you to assist all you can for the cause of Canada, Great Britain and civilization."

Owing to the magnitude of the undertaking, the speaker stated the general committee believed that the campaign should be divided into three districts, each with its own committee. The first district, he stated, would be the central district, the second the northern district, and the third the southern district.

Mr. Silverwood asked for 300 women volunteers to canvass the homes, and get into touch with all the women and children in the household.

The general committee, he stated, has already secured fifteen teams of men to canvass the factories and other business centers during the three days of the campaign, Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, February 19, 20 and 21, following a grand mass meeting to be addressed by Sir Herbert Ames in the Princess Mary Garden, Friday evening, February 17.

May Raise \$300,000.
He suggested that the residential district be canvassed according to the division of wards, which in turn might be subdivided. He advised the appointment of a general for each ward, and a captain for each sub-division. A suggested objective for the women to reach was \$300,000.

Upon the conclusion of Mr. Silverwood's address, Sir George G. Gibbons called for a motion from the women present, pledging co-operation and financial assistance. In this connection, he urged united effort and the sinking of all sectional differences in the interests of the great cause.

Mr. L. Somerville, acting president of the Red Cross Society and president of the Canadian War Contingent Association, on behalf of the organization she represented, moved that the women accept the share of responsibility offered them, and named as members of the committee the following from the Red Cross: Mrs. W. D. Somerville, Mrs. E. Somerville, George T. Brown, Bowker, Frank Leonard, A. E. Cooper and J. E. C.

Seconding the motion, Mrs. T. H. Smallman, first vice-regent of the United Kingdom, moved that the committee, representing the order, Messrs. R. W. D. Somerville, E. H. Wright, Allan McLean, E. H. Council of Women.
Mrs. Tarker spoke on behalf of the Council of Women. Mrs. F. H. Hughes for the Union Mothers' Club; Miss Yeates for the Woman Teachers' Association; Miss Armstrong for the Women's Music Club. Representation of the Canadian War Contingent Association, the Canadian Red Cross Society, the Canadian Women's Club and other organizations not represented yesterday.

Another meeting will be held in the same place next Monday afternoon at 4 o'clock, when the general committee will have the details of the campaign fully worked out, and be in a position to give all information required in the meantime the women's committee is entrusted with the mission of securing 300 volunteer canvassers among the women's organizations which they represent, or others willing to assist.

Referring to the objective of \$300,000 set for the London campaign, Dr. Tucker declared that amount might easily be raised on automobiles and amusements alone. "Consider," he said, what we in London, Canada, have heard and seen. We have seen the atrocities of war. One man dropped on the city. One man most traversed street, would cost London more than \$300,000. Yet this is what other cities and peoples have had to endure, and far more, right in England.

AUTOS IN COLLISION.
Two automobiles, a Chalmers roadster, owned by J. Beecher, and a Ford, owned by the Bayliss taxi service, collided on Dundas street between English and Beatty streets Sunday afternoon.

The Chalmers car going west turned out to pass street car, and in so doing moved along in the south car track. On seeing the taxi cab, the driver of the Chalmers tried to turn out, but his wheels were fast in the track. Both drivers then tried to stop, but the larger car continued to skid forward after the brakes were set, and the head-on collision resulted.

A front fender was smashed on the Chalmers, while a bent front axle, a broken fender and other damages were done to the Ford.

According to George D. Dixon, vice-president of the Pennsylvania Railroad, who discussed the relation of freight rates to the cost of food to the consumer at the annual convention of the commission merchants in Philadelphia, "the freight charges on food products are so small that it is generally conceded that retail prices, in the overwhelming majority of cases, would not be affected at all if the railroad transportation costs were wiped out altogether. Take the case of milk, for instance, a thing which is very expensive and difficult for railroads to handle, and for which they provide the very highest character of transportation service. We haul milk to Philadelphia for about one-cent and a half. It retails at 10 or 12 cents, and even more."

Some brands suppose the freight rates on milk were out in half. It is likely the reduction of a quarter of a cent per quart would be reflected by any change in the retail price of 80, too, in the case of fruit, the high cost of living does not depend on freight rates. "California oranges," says Mr. Dixon, "are sold in New York for \$1.15 per 100 pounds, which is less than one cent for bringing them an average 3,000 miles away. Southern Florida grapefruit cost 40 cents for 100 pounds to bring 1,000 miles to Philadelphia."

"A 27-pound Georgia watermelon is delivered in this city at a transportation charge of 11.2 cents, arriving by a fast freight running practically on passenger schedule. Early peaches from the same state cost \$4.5 per crate, 45 pounds to a crate, a very small fraction of a cent per peach. Philadelphia gets Southern New Jersey peaches for 1/2 to 3/4 cent. New York, three-quarters of the way across the continent, is 25 cents a crate weighing 45 pounds, probably in the neighborhood of a cent for each cantaloupe."

ASKS BETTER SERVICE ON HURON AND BRUCE

Council Asking Railway Board to Restore Former Schedule.

The city council at its session last night unanimously passed a resolution asking the Dominion railway commission to restore the former service on the London, Huron & Bruce.

Controller Little pointed out that the present arrangement was not only a hardship on the city of London, but a very serious handicap to the small towns and villages along the line. Children were unable to attend the high schools, and in other ways, it was very difficult to do business with the outside world.

The resolution was carried as follows: Whereas the Dominion railway commission has ordered the curtailment of railway service on the London, Huron & Bruce, and caused the system to be replaced by a temporary service, the council of the city of London, Ontario, do hereby petition the Dominion railway commission to restore the former service on the London, Huron & Bruce.

And whereas the corporation of the city of London and other municipalities along the London, Huron & Bruce railway have been ordered to provide a passenger service through a territory which trades almost exclusively from this centre;

Be it resolved that this council petition the Dominion Railway Commission to immediately restore the train service on the London, Huron & Bruce, including the daily morning train which has been removed by the order of the board;

And that the city clerk be authorized to place a copy of this resolution in the hands of the board of trade, which, along with the Commercial Travelers' Association and municipalities along the London, Huron & Bruce Railway, are jointly petitioning the Dominion Railway Commission to this effect.

ABILITY COUNTS MORE THAN OPPORTUNITIES

Vegetable Growers' Debate Was Very Keenly Contested.
