RUNNING RISK OF CAPTURE.

LONDON, June 18.—Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency.—Reuter's correspondent at Italian headquarters points out that unless the Austrians can establish solid bridgeheads where they have crossed the Plave and get guns over, especially onto the small section of Montello, which they still hold, probably the only result of their crossing will be that they will become prisoners.

London, June 18.—The Austrian pincers are not closing upon Italy with the precision of last October, when they forced back the Italian armies of Gen-

In the Alps the Austrians have been unable further to advance their lines, since their initial onslaught-last Saturday. Everywhere, from the Asiago plateau sector eastward to the Plave River all their attacks have been quickly repulsed by the Allied troops, who, in their turn, have delivered counter-attacks, regained lost terrain, inflicted heavy casualties on the enemy, and taken a considerable number of prisoners. FOE REOPENS OFFENSIVE; SMASH AT RUINED CATHEDRAL CITY FAILS

German Attempt To Encircle and Capture Rheims Broken Up By French Fire and Fierce Counter-Attacks-Unable To Reach Even Front Lines At Most Points-Gain Footing In Woods to East of City But Are Quickly Expelled.

Paris, June 19.—The Germans last night, after a violent preparatory bombardment, began an attack on the Rheims front, between Vrigny and La Pompelle, the war office announced today. On the western front of the attack the enemy was not even able to reach the front line. In the centre, before the city, the Germans were completely repulsed and suffered heavy losses. East of Rheims the French were equally successful.

The French are resisting the German blow with entire success. The text of the statement follows:

"Last night at 6 o'clock the Germans delivered a violent preparatory artillery fire along the whole front of Rheims from the region of Vreigny, west of the city, as far east as La Pompelle. At 9 o'clock the enemy infantry began an attack on the French positions between these two points. 'The French troops resisted the German attack with complete success, the counter-barrage of the French artillery proving very strong.

STOPPED BY FRENCH FIRE.

Between Vreigny and Ormes the German assault troops were stopped by the French fire and forced to return many times to their lines of departure, and were not finally able to reach the French positions.

Around Rheims violent combats developed, during the course of which the enemy sufheavy losses and was everywhere repulsed.

"East of Rheims the fighting likewise ended to the advantage of the French. The Germans having been successful in penetrating the woods northeast of Sillery, were driven out by a French counter-attack.

"Prisoners taken in the region of Rheims declared that the town was attacked by three divisions, which were ordered to take the place at all costs during the night."

The front of the new German attack is the semi-circle drawn by the enemy about the city of Rheims in the recent offensive on the Aisne front. The Rheims region comprised the left flank of the German attack. Ground was given by the French on both sides of the cathedral city, but the town itself and the nearby protecting forts were held against the German onslaught and have

RHEIMS HEMMED IN. Rheims, however, was hemmed in on three sides by the enemy, and it has been considered only a question of time when the Germans would make a concerted movement to oust its defenders. The front of the present attack from Vrigny, west of the city, to La Pompelle, around the semi-circle to the east, is approximately fourteen miles.

THE WAR SITUATION

Fierce attacks are being made by the Austrians to overcome the Italian resistance along the Plave, but the defensive line still holds. Apparently the enemy sees his only hope of success in enlarging his gains across the Plave, having been given a disastrous check in the mountains from west of Aslago to

Held In Mountains.

In the mountains the Austrians have been generally on the defensive since they were checked and then thrown back over the terrain gained Saturday on the first day of the offensive.
