WILDSESSION **OFCONGRESS BURIES WET**

Overwhelmingly Defeats the Amendment For Two and

Three-Quarters Beer. REFUSES TO GIVE QUARTER

Representatives Roar Disapproval of "Liberal" Efforts, While Galleries Cheer.

WASHINGTON, July 14.—Prohibition forces took full control in the House today, refused to permit a vote on a straight out motion to repeal the war-time act, defeated overwhelmingly an amendment providing for the sale of two and three-quarters percent beer and stood solidly against all attacks on the general enforcement measure.

Just as fast as one "Liberal" amendment was offered by opponents of prohibition it was voted down without ceremony, always by a triple vote, for the minority, fighting every inch of ground, demanded a division after the ayes and nayes were called, and then asked for tellers. Before the House got through with the first section of the first part of the three-part bill there was more disorder on the floor than at any time this session.

The disturbance arose first during an attempt by Representative Blanton, Democrat. Texas, to speak a second time against an amendment which would have given a jury the right to define intoxicants and was increased during an address by Representative Gallivan, Democrat, Massachusetts, who deciared members voting dry should print in the Congressional Record exactly how much liquor they had stored in their homes and offices.

The Real Battle.

The real battle of the day, however, was over the amendment to define an intoxicant as a beverage containing more than two and three-quarters per cent alcohol, instead of more than one-half of one per cent, as written in the bill. The amendment after a heated debate was defeated, by a record vote of 151 to 90—this was about the relative decision on all amendments. Another amendment by Representative Igoe, Democrat, Missouri, which would have stricken out all definition of intoxicants, was also defeated, 128 to 83.

There was the utmost confusion at times, despite vigorous whacks with the gavel, and some of the prohibition leaders applauded every move in their favor. The galleries, filled largely with women and officers of anti-liquor organizations, broke into applause when the House roared its disapproval of two and three-quarters beer.

Hearst Labels Story of Union Government Hot Weather Guessing.

HOPE TO PAVE WAY FOR A PEACE PACT IN THE INDUSTRIES

Members of Labor Sub-Committee Will Meet Today.

TO ARRANGE CONFERENCE

Employers and Employees To Be Represented at Gathering Planned For August.

OTTAWA, July 14 .- The labor subcommittee, under the chairmanship of Senator Robertson, will meet in Ottawa tomorrow to make preliminary arrangements for the coming national industrial conference. The labor subcommittee is an offshoot of the cabinet reconstruction committee and has among its members representatives

reconstruction committee and has among its members representatives both of capital and labor. It will tomorrow consider primarily:

A—The date when the national industrial conference shall meet.

B—How the various associations and unions of employers and employees will be represented.

C—The method by which representatives will be chosen.

It is expected that the conference will be held in Ottawa. The date will be as early as possible, possibly in August. The conference is the outcome of recommendations made both by the labor sub-committee and by the majority commissioners of the industrial relations commission. It will be representative of all industrial interests, both of employers and of employed. Associated with them will be representatives of the nine provincial governments, invited with a view to secure unity in industrial legislation throughout the various provinces and also with a view to considering the enactment of legislation along lines suggested by the report of the industrial relations commission and on the principles laid down in the international labor charter as assented to by Canada in the treaty of peace. A number of the recommendations made by the industrial relations commission with as been held, are outside the competence of the Dominion Parliament—such as legislation limiting hours of labor, and on these co-ordinate action by the provinces will be sought.

Hope Greater Unity.

It is confidently expected that the conference will pave the way to greater unity on the part of the employers and employed. Based in the main on the industrial conference called by Mr. Lloyd George shortly after the signing of the armistice, the Canadian conference will, in its deliberations, range over the whole industrial situation. As the result of its labors it is probable that there will be set up in Canada a permanent joint advisory council along the lines of the "labor parliament" of Great Britain. The coming conference will be the first of its kind in the history of the Dominion. Some months ago a joint memorial was presented to the Government by representatives of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association and of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada. It was then remarked that the delegation was the first to appear before the Dominion Government as representing both capital and labor.
