**CLEVELAND HIKERS
COMPLETE LONG WALK
TO LONDON TODAY**

Ohio City Boys Arriving at
Noon After Tramping
From Windsor.

This city will be invaded this morning
by the Cleveland Hikers. The Hikers
may have been seen on the downtown
streets yesterday afternoon and last
evening, but their official invasion is
not due until about noon today. At
that time they expect to complete the
last lap of their walk from Windsor to
London. Yesterday at noon they strag-
gled into Springfield and pitched camp
there. Tired, footsore and hungry, the
leaders of the party thought it wise to
rest up for a triumphal entry here.

The Cleveland Hikers are a band of
young men, ranging in ages from 15 to
25, who set out from Cleveland on
Monday, August 11, on a trip to Niag-
ara Falls and Buffalo, by way of Detroit.
They took boat from Cleveland to De-
troit, and then crossed into Canada by
the ferry to Windsor. Then began the
most interesting, and for many, the
hardest part of the journey. The trip
from Windsor to this city was to be
made on foot. Each of the party who
walked the whole distance is to receive

a bronze belt buckle in token of his
ability as a long-distance pedestrian.
The boys set out on the walk on the
afternoon of Tuesday, August 12. They
claim they have been averaging eighteen
miles a day. Most of them are in splen-
did shape, and even those who are
nursing blisters and other ailments of
the feet, express themselves as delighted
with the trip.

Some Hopped Into Autos.
Not all of them are eligible for the
belt buckles, however. Several passed
up their claims by hopping into autos
and accepting a ride at the invitation
of the driver. Most of the footsore
jaunters took advantage of lifts here
and there along the road, in order to
keep the party from becoming too scat-
tered. But the majority trudged the
weary miles and enjoyed every bit of
it. They collected a lot of tan and sun-
burn. Most of them went bareheaded,
and all are dressed in khaki shirts and
trousers, some adding to their military
appearance by wearing puttees. They
cook their own food and carry sleeping
bags with them. The road trip hasn't
added any to the neatness of their dress,
but being good, healthy, sound boys,
dress doesn't cut any figure with them.
They were a strange contrast to the
downtown shoppers when they breezed
into the city yesterday afternoon, com-
ing up the Springfield cars after they
had completed their camping ar-
rangements there. Most of them forget
their aches and pains in their eager-
ness to see what the city looked like and
no doubt the prospect of attending a
picture show revived them considerably.

Leave Here for Falls.
They plan to march the remaining
distance from Springfield Park to the
city this morning, and will leave this
evening by train for Welland. From
there they go to Niagara Falls for a

day and thence to Buffalo where they
will remain for a day or two before
taking the boat back to Cleveland.
The party is in charge of Karl Kist,
Harry Hoogesteiger, Rudolph Concor
and William Buttress. The boys are a
well-behaved, manly crowd, and
their arrival here today will attract a
lot of attention. They all reside in
Cleveland.
