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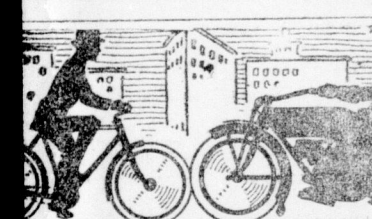

Germans Will Come Friday for Signing

PARIS, June 24.—The German delegation which will sign the peace treaty will arrive at Versailles on Friday morning, the French foreign office has been informed. It is thought probable in French circles that the signature of the treaty will take place at 2 o'clock Friday afternoon.

France Has Adopted Eight Hour Day for Work Aboard Ships

Other Powers Will Be Asked To Make Similar Rule.

PARIS, June 24.—A bill limiting work aboard public and private vessels to eight hours a day or forty-eight hours a week was adopted today by the Chamber of Deputies.

During the debate several deputies expressed the wish that negotiations be opened with other powers to enact similar legislation for their seamen, on the ground that France would be handicapped if she were the only one to have eight-hour-day regulations. The Government promised to begin negotiations.

WHEAT CONTROL MADE UNIVERSAL THING IN THE UNITED STATES

NEW YORK, June 24.—Julius Barnes, United States wheat director, announced that President Wilson has signed a proclamation putting under the license of the wheat director persons, firms, corporations and associations dealing in wheat or wheat flour, baking products manufactured either wholly or partly from wheat flour. The only exceptions are farmers and small bakers.

CHILD CAUSES FIRE. ST. MARYS, June 24.—The fire department made a run to the home of Richard Moore, Water street south, in the early part of the afternoon, when the double dwelling, his three-year-old daughter, who had gone upstairs, got a hold of some matches and set fire to a mattress of a bed. The fire was quickly put out, and the principal damage was from water. There was no insurance on the contents.

BRITISH EXPECT TO SALVAGE SOME OF GERMAN WARSHIPS

LONDON, June 24.—Three of the German ships which their crews attempted to sink at Scapa Flow Saturday have been beached, and the Baden is moored in readiness for beaching. It was announced officially today. There is extensive prospect of salvaging the ships in good condition if the necessary apparatus arrives before bad weather sets in. The ships beached are the cruisers Emden, Frankfurt and Nürnberg.

Two destroyers are afloat and eighteen have been beached. It is added that there is no prospect of saving the other destroyers without elaborate operations.

BURSTING AUTO TIRE KILLS DETROIT MAN

DETROIT, June 24.—Over-inflation of an automobile tire caused the death of Hudson Pirie, aged 39, here today. The man evidently failed to observe that he had exceeded 80 pounds' pressure, and a moment later the tire exploded, throwing Pirie with great force against a brick wall, fracturing his skull. He leaves a widow and three children.

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MIDDLEMEN ARE GETTING CREAM IN MEN'S SUITS

Merchant Tailor Says There Are Four or Five Profits Exacted.

SOME HONORABLE HOUSES

Witness Thinks Certain Firms Are Making Less Than in 1914.

OTTAWA, June 24.—J. E. Preston, merchant tailor, Ottawa, gave evidence this morning before the cost of living committee of the Commons to show that he was compelled to buy his goods through middlemen. He said, "I have gone through four or five hands before it reached the public. The distributor got 25 per cent and there were other commissions."

He stated that, whereas he charged \$15 for making a suit in 1914, he now receives from \$25 to \$35, according to the grade of cloth. Wages had gone up 100 per cent, with 25 per cent less in production.

He showed a sample of cloth which he said he had bought in 1914 for \$10.90. He did not handle domestic goods, only first-class imported Scotch or English tweeds.

Some Houses "Honorable." E. R. Fisher of Ottawa, stated that his average turnover in the last eight years showed a profit of 7.51 per cent. The spread was 27 per cent. Suits which cost \$15 wholesale in 1914 now cost from \$25 to \$37.

He considered that, although there were some profiteers in the business, honorable houses were not making as good profits as they did before 1914. He declared that the statements regarding the trade made recently by Dr. MacPail, the cost of living commissioner, were erroneous.

Harris Abattoir Profits. J. S. McLean of the Harris Abattoir, Toronto, was another witness, but, as he had not brought all the papers required to show the evidence, he was postponed. He stated that the capital stock was \$2,000,000, all common and paid up. The net profit in 1918 was \$220,000, and in 1917, \$240,000. At its inauguration half the stock in the company was owned by the William Davies Company, but this was not the case now. He said the directors were not making as good profits as they did before 1914.
