Clemenceau Says French Feel
League An Insufficient
Guarantee.

Railway Strike in Britain May Yet Be Averted

Sir Eric Geddes Consents To
Meet Leaders For Further
Discussion.

LONDON, Sept. 24.—(By the Associated Press.)—By a curious coincidence on the day that Sir Eric Geddes had formally taken up his duties as minister of transport, the Government was confronted by an ultimatum threatening stoppage of the whole railway system of the country, unless a basis for the standardization of the men's wages, which has been in dispute since the month of March, is settled to the men's satisfaction. When it is remembered how fierce was the opposition to the new ministry, met in the cabinet sat for three hours today, considering the crisis, after which it was authoritatively announced that the Government had intimated its willingness to continue the negotiations on the ground that some "misunderstanding" existed, Sir Eric Geddes' consent to meet the men's leaders any time tomorrow morning. Increased Supplies

LONDON, Sept. 24.—(Reuter's Agency.)—For some months past increased supplies of foodstuffs have been arriving in Britain from Canada and Australia in the holds of returning troopships. There are at present large troopships laden with food en route from New Zealand to England. On the whole, food prices in Britain are tending to come down. It is claimed in some quarters that the moral effect of the profiteering and the extensive creation of local committees have had a good deal to do with this fact.

Urge Co-Operation
of Agriculturists
and Labor Party

WINNIPEG, Sept. 24.—Co-operation between labor and agriculturists was advocated by the executive of the Dominion Labor Party by Bruce Edie, representing the agriculturists. Mr. Edie declared that the interests are the same, and we must work together to get results. The suggestion received the enthusiastic support of the executive. Secretary Robert Kingdon of the labor party, stated today that they were being made to hold meetings in Winnipeg and adjoining constituencies to further the idea. "I have no doubt," he said, "that labor and the farmers will be co-operating in the near future."

AT COMMERCE PROBE

REGINA, Sask., Sept. 24.—As a result of the announcement, that a board of commerce is about to institute an inquiry into the causes of the textile and boot and shoe industries, the provincial governments of Saskatchewan and Manitoba have not yet decided whether they will be represented at such inquiry by counsel in view of the tremendous importance of the high cost of living, clothing and footwear to the consumers of the west. It is believed that the Alberta Government will also join in this joint representation.

The fire spread rapidly and a back street attracted a crowd of about 100 around the police department, it being thought the firebug had been caught. The fire was let go in the police court this morning.

KITCHENER, Sept. 24.—A rumor that Gavin Barbour, U. F. O. candidate for North Waterloo, is going to retire from the field was emphatically denied today by Mr. Barbour. Mr. Barbour declared he has assurance of a solid farmer vote, and is prepared to stand by the convention at which he was nominated.

TURNING DOWN REPORT. SPLIT CAUSES TORY
CANDIDATE TO DROP
OUT IN S. ESSEX

WINDSOR, Sept. 24.—For the first time in the history of Essex County politics the Conservative Party has placed no candidate in the field to contest the seat in the Ontario Legislature for Lambton, W. G. Wichee, M.P.

William Smith of Kingsville, president of the South Essex Conservative Association, declared today that the party had decided not to nominate a candidate to oppose Mr. Wichee. There will, however, be a contest, as the United Farmers' organization has nominated Milton Fox as its standard-bearer.

While Lewis Wigle, mayor of Leamington, will make the race as an independent.

The selection of Mr. Fox, who has been associated with the government party more than a decade, caused such a division in the Tory party that it was deemed inadvisable to make an independent candidate.
