TORONTO, Nov. 3.—Varsity Second broke the three-cornered tie in the middle series of the inter-collegiate, by beating St. Mikes 6 to 0 this afternoon. St. Michael's outplayed the winners in the last period and lost chances to win because of over-anxiety, when within the scoring zone, when the victory gives University of Toronto a clear lead, and they should have little difficulty in winning the Western division title.
