"MERELY A HANDICAP" SAYS BLIND OFFICER

Lieut. Baker, Queen's Student, Does Not Consider Loss of Sight an Affliction.

Special to The Toronto World. KINGSTON, Ont., Aug. 18.—With a smile on his face, Lieut. Edwin Baker, of the Queen's student, who lost the sight of both his eyes fighting at the front, told a large gathering in the village of Odesa, where he was welcomed today, that he did not consider the loss of his eyes an affliction. "It is merely a handicap," he added, and the young hero was loudly cheered.

At St. Dunstan's School for the Blind in London, Eng., Lieut. Baker finished his course in electrical engineering which he expects to follow despite his handicap. While in England he took part in a regatta on the Thames and carried away two prizes, including a beautiful silver cup, which is now at his father's home in Collins Bay.

Before the reception was tendered today he wrote six letters undated to friends in the Old Country and Canada on the typewriter, he having taken a course in typewriting at the School for the Blind.

NAPANEE, Aug. 18.—At the regular meeting of the cheese board here 705 boxes of white and 150 colored were offered. All sold at 19c.



PORTUGAL IS ABOUT TO BREAK INTO WAR

Minister of War Announces Purpose to Help Entente Allies.

LISBON, via Paris, Aug. 18.—Major Norton Mattoz, the Portuguese minister of war, announced today that Portugal will soon participate in the war, fighting on the side of the entente allies.

The Portuguese Congress voted to join the entente allies in the war in November, 1914. A Portuguese naval commander seized thirty-six German and Austrian vessels in the Tagus River in February, 1916, and the following March Germany declared war on Portugal because of this action. The Portuguese troops were called to the colors on March 16.

DROWNED IN GARBAGE BARREL.

Other subscriptions include Bramford, \$1,181; Port Arthur, \$5,000; county of Ontario, \$5,000; Lennox and Addington, \$1,800; Northumberland and Durham, \$5,150; and Dufferin, \$1,088.
