ated in an engagement near Tomos Pass, south of the Transylvanian city of Kronstadt, according to Vienna dispatches received by Amsterdam. The invading forces were driven back to Rumanian soil, it was asserted.

Berlin claims reports were received today to the effect that the Rumanians have been defeated in their first efforts to force a passage through three mountain passes into Hungary.

Successes on Whole Front? Rumanian troops attacked on the whole Tectonic front, yesterday and obtained successes, with a Bucharest despatch transmitted from Rome by wireless today.

Desperate fighting on the border between Rumania and Hungary is reported in an Exchange Telegraph despatch from Berne, Switzerland. The Rumanians, the message says, are making furious efforts to capture the important mountain passes.

This information, the despatch says, is contained in a telegram from Austrian headquarters, published in the Bund of Berne.

Russ Troops for Bukovina. Russia is sending large bodies of troops to Bukovina, according to a Bucharest despatch filed by way of Rome to the Petit Parisien. Preparations also are being made for establishing contact between Russian and Rumanian forces across the Danube, the despatch says.

These advances important convoys of troops have been operating for several days on the railway line running from Lipkany, on the Russo-Rumanian border, along the northern bank of the River Pruth, toward Novoseliza and Czernowitz, the capital of Bukovina.

Twenty twenty minutes military trains leave for Bukovina. In southern Bessarabia the Russian army have made great preparations and have brought up pontoons to construct four bridges across the Danube at Tulcea, a Rumanian town near the mouth of the river, to establish a junction between the Russian and Rumanian forces.

Invaders of Hungary. The invasion of Hungary by Russian and Rumanian is not only possible, says Lieut.-Col. Roussel, the military critic of La Liberté de Paris, but it is imminent.

Gen. Letchitzky, the Russian commander in Galicia, the writer adds, "holds nearly 100 kilometers (60 miles) of ridges from the two Bystritzas toward Rajalov, as far as Kirilbaba. He will easily lead the Rumanians, who, hardly on entering Transylvania, will certainly envelope the army of Gen. Kovesics if the latter does not retreat quickly. Field Marshal von Hindenburg will be unable to help him, as from the Danube River to the Stokhod Gen. Brusilov is holding Von Hindenburg solidly.

Probable Line of Attack. The Times' military correspondent, discussing the probable next step by Rumania, says:

"The strategic situation points to a combination of Rumania with the present Russian offensive. This line of attack will lead the Rumanian army into Transylvania, where a majority of the population favor the invaders. At the same time the passage of the Danube, an advance on Sofia, and the breaking down of the Bulgarian power in co-operation with the allied forces at Saloniki, has its attractions."

The Morning Post says: "The independent of the Bulgarian front, where a decision would be merely of secondary importance, fully armed and equipped by Austro-Hungarian and partly by Serbians. Bulgaria's Attitude Passive. The Bucharest correspondent of The Petit Parisien writes that he is informed that Bulgaria will not declare war on Rumania even though it is Russian territory. Despatches from Germany say that Turkey and Bulgaria are expected to declare war against Rumania within 24 hours.

Extensive troop movements are underway in the Balkans. The entrance of Rumania has lengthened the front on nearly 800 miles, which necessitates heavy reinforcements in that zone of hostilities.
