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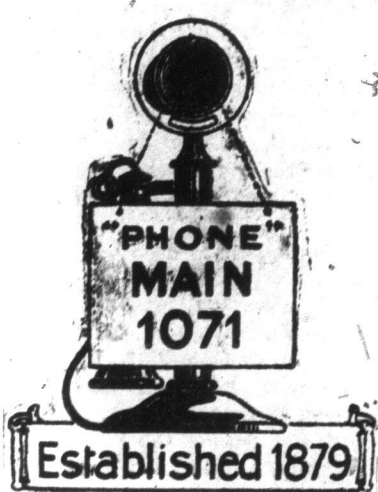

BIGGEST BRITISH CREDIT IS MOVED

chancellor of the exchequer, spoke warning the government of the absolute necessity of curtailing all unnecessary expenditure to prevent the dangerous inflation of prices, the general debate had no great interest, the main feature being strong criticisms by John Dillon and others of the Salonica expedition. Mr. Dillon, referring to rumors that Serbia was intending to make a separate peace with Austria and demanding that the government say whether Serbia was to be deserted, declared that the British army in Salonica had been demoralized by 18 months of inaction in pestilent surroundings.

Not to Desert Serbia.
Lord Robert Cecil, minister of blockade, replying, characterized Mr. Dillon's charge as absolutely untrue. He said there was no intention whatever of rescinding from the pledges for the full restoration of and reparation for Serbia. While declining to reveal the government's plans, he said he would restate its war aims.

Germany is, and must be, our chief enemy. The broad principles we are fighting for are these:
"First, that we should stand by our allies; second, we are fighting for a stable statement, for a sound and satisfactory peace, not a conquest or mere domination, but on some national principle as far as might be which would secure that settlement. When arrived at it should be from change and alteration in the future."
"Personally I wish to see how far President Wilson's proposals can be made practicable for barriers against future wars. The government's desire for the destruction of German militarism is only part of its general purpose to secure a lasting peace. It desires it only because it is the greatest danger to the future peace of Europe."

CHINAMAN IDENTIFIED.

The body of the Chinaman who was found drowned in the bay on Monday was identified at the morgue last night as Leong Hong Ki, 247 Lokan avenue. He had been missing since Sunday from the laundry where he worked at that address. The identification was made by So Ling, proprietor of the laundry. Coroner Plews opened an inquest last night and adjourned the hearing until Tuesday evening.

AMERICAN ARMY OF MILLION MEN AT ONCE

Double Contemplated First Draft Foreshadowed by Request for Five Billion Dollars.

Washington, July 24.—An American army of 1,000,000 men for service abroad at once, instead of the 500,000 contemplated for the first draft, is foreshadowed by the government's request for an additional \$5,000,000,000, made to the senate finance committee today.

The first 1,000,000 men are to be made up of the first draft army of 500,000, the national guard, and the regulars. It is improbable that the first draft will be increased, but the government is arranging its finances for other drafts without the necessity of going to congress again for money. Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo today prepared new war estimates for congress, very much in excess of those already presented, and which will necessitate raising revenue not contemplated when the senate finance committee revised the war tax bill. The bill probably will be further revised. The government, basing an esti-

mate on the needs of the army and navy, wants the war tax bill to authorize an additional five billion dollars.

PRESIDENT WILSON SIGNS AEROPLANE BILL

Huge Appropriation for America's Plan to Overwhelm Germans From Air.

Washington, July 24.—The \$640,000,000 airplane bill became a law today with President Wilson's signature. This immense appropriation is only the beginning of preparations for the campaign intended to overwhelm Germany from the air. More than 20,000 planes are to be built as a first increment, and there will be many thousands of aviators. The first task will be the instruction of the vast army of American fliers.

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BRITISH IN RAIDS AT FOUR POINTS

Daylight Activity Produces Effective Results in Ypres Area.

London, July 24.—The British official communication issued this evening says:
"During the day our troops successfully raided enemy trenches at four points east and northeast of Ypres and brought back prisoners in each case. An enemy raiding party entered our trenches during the night east of Laventie, but was driven out after a bombing encounter. Another party of the enemy succeeded in making one of our saps east of Givency by Le Bassee. One of our men is missing."
"Great activity by our aerial forces continued yesterday and much successful work again accomplished in co-operation with our artillery. Over more than four tons of bombs were dropped by raiding squadrons on the enemy airbases, ammunition dumps and railway junctions. Fewer German aeroplanes were encountered and the fighting was not so severe."
"Three hostile machines were downed and three others driven down out of control. None of our machines is missing."

The German day communication says:
"Western theatre—Army group of Crown Prince Rupprecht: The artillery duel in Flanders continues to rage day and night with an intensity never previously reached. Reconnoitering thrusts against our front are increasing. Between La Bassee Canal and Lens lively fighting continues. Nocturnal reconnoitering enterprises by the enemy on both sides of Hulluch were unsuccessful."
"The German night communication says: 'There have been strong artillery engagements in Flanders.'"

MORE NOMINEES FOR CONVENTION

British Government Names Delegates to Dublin Gathering.

London, July 24.—Andrew Bonar Law, chancellor of the exchequer, today announced the government's nominees as delegates to the Irish convention. They included the Earl of Dufferin, president of the Irish Reform Association; the Earl of Gosport, the Earl of Granard, Baron MacDonnell, Sir William Gouding, chairman of the Great Southern and Western Railway of Ireland; Sir Horace Curzon Plunkett, founder of the Irish Agricultural Society; Sir George W. Russell, former under-secretary of the home department; Sir Crawford McCullagh, former lord mayor of Belfast; Sir Bertram C. A. Windle, the provost of Trinity College, Dublin; Patrick Dempsey, Martin Murphy, Edward Lyaght, Alexander McDowell and Sir William Whitla, professor of materia medica and therapeutics in Queen's College, Belfast.
The number of labor representatives has been increased from five to seven. The number of delegates who have accepted to date is 95.

HAMILTON NEWS

Hamilton, July 24.—A communication from the Hamilton Recruiting League suggesting public observance of the anniversary of the commencement of the war was received by the board of control. By motion of Controller Wright the secretary was instructed to write to the city clergymen, urging that they hold appropriate services for that occasion on Sunday, August 5.

Last year the board of control made a grant of \$500 to the Babies' Welfare Association. This year that amount was cut down to \$300. Today the association said it could not get thru with that sum. By motion of Controller Wright and Controller Torrell an additional \$200 was voted.

The Canadian Red Cross Society fruit kitchen, 22 South Park street, was opened for the season's work today. The first consignment of fruit has been received. It was cultivated and picked by members of the Hamilton Rotary Club on the farm of W. J. Southern, near Bronte. HANNA ABLE TO PROTECT PUBLIC

W. F. Maclean, M.P., Urges Rigid Inquiry Into Food Extortion Charges.

Ottawa, July 24.—Economic issues were discussed in the house tonight after the final disposition of the conscription bill and Sir Thomas White, minister of finance, announced that he would lay proposals of the government with respect to an income tax before the house tomorrow. There was a brief running debate upon the conscription bill, and the report of the O'Connor committee on food storage, warehouses and the high cost of living, and the appointment of a royal commission to complete the O'Connor report and make further investigations.

W. F. Maclean (South York) protested that the people of this country wanted less talk and more action. They were little interested in the personnel of the various commissions, but they were greatly interested in having an end put to extortionate prices. EXTREMISTS CAUSE RUSSIAN RETREAT

Forces of Disorder Disaffect Certain Sections of Army.

London, July 24.—A great tragedy is being enacted in the life of the Russian people, according to Arthur Henderson, member of the British War Council, and representative of the British government, returned from an extended visit to Russia. He is convinced that unless the situation is handled with firmness there must be an inevitable disaster.

The difficulties the government had to cope with were such as no other government ever experienced. It was impossible to convey anything like an adequate conception of the extent to which the extremists dominated the life of the capital, demoralizing the army and navy, especially those units in close proximity to Petrograd.

The true extremists, he declared, did not represent more than a small minority of the population, but such had been the spirit of terror exercised, together with their destructive influence over certain sections of the military forces, that they had rendered the army and navy, especially those units in close proximity to Petrograd, demoralized.

Mr. Henderson considered that the most disastrous experiment of the revolution was the relaxation of discipline in the army and navy, coupled with the direct association of those services with the political and revolutionary propaganda of the extremists. WAR SUMMARY

BRITISH raiding parties are showing extreme energy against the enemy, and their artillery, according to Berlin, is violently in action along an extended front in Flanders. The Germans in their official bulletins betray their expectations of another British advance. Field Marshal Haig has been proceeding with the organization of further attacks. These, it is said, are to be on a larger scale than ever; even, perhaps, a determined effort to secure decisive victory in the west. The British have now the plain of Lille under the fire of their guns; and since to retreat from France the enemy would have to pivot on Lille, they may proceed with an enveloping movement in that region in order to drive the German army off its lines of communication and retreat. A really great victory in the west, comparable to Salamanca or Vittoria in the Peninsula War, is required to right the Russian situation. The allies, in other words, may hasten the development of their plans for a new and greater Sedan, which the French probably intended for the anniversary of Sedan Day, early in September. The allies have the stage already set pretty well for the development.

The Germans in eastern Galicia have crossed the Sereth River at a point south of Tarnopol after defeating the Russian detachments set to guard the stream. They have thus, unless they can be immediately driven back, turned the line of the Sereth River. Owing to the peril of this advance the Russians on the front south of the Dniester, have also to retire, and they are already evacuating Stanislaw. The enemy is thus easily recovering all the ground won in hard fighting. Insubordination is also responsible for a withdrawal of certain units without fighting on the northern front. Russian troops occupied the German positions on both sides of the Vilna-Dvinsk Railway when the disaffected units returned to their original trenches after German pressure. A number of these units also refused to obey commands during battle. Thus the simple-minded Russian soldiers are taking literally to heart the socialist jargon of the west and the propaganda against fighting the workmen of other countries. As is seen in the south, the Germans know how to turn such beliefs to their advantage. Berlin, for many years it is known, has trained the most incendiary of agitators and has sent them abroad for the undermining of other countries.

The Russian higher command, in its official bulletins, has adopted the policy of the utmost frankness about the unsoldierly conduct of the troops. Arthur Henderson, who has just returned to London from Petrograd, says that only stern measures will save the new republic from a big disaster. Kerensky is adopting these measures, and he promises it necessary a policy of blood and iron. In the meantime, if the German advance continues, the Russian army, fighting with the form of field and not of trench warfare; and if the Russians secure a sufficient number of solid troops for battle concentration on a front the length of the Russian southwestern front, 5,000 to 10,000 men a mile, a force that he lacks on the southwestern front. His army in that region probably numbers not over 50 divisions.

The French, returning to the counter-attack yesterday, threw the Germans from the first line positions on the Calonne and the Casemates Plateau, north of the Aisne. The French had lost these positions, blasted by the offensive of the enemy on Sunday last. One small work, blasted by the artillery fire, remains unoccupied by either side. The French on the Casemates Plateau also advanced their line at several points. These are inch. The battle for these positions on Monday was extremely desperate, according to press correspondents.
