WHITE WOMAN SLAYS CHINK.

Used Cleaver While Later Was Asleep—Woman May Die.

New York, Nov. 4.—Jim Wo Kee, a Chinese laundryman, is dead from terrible wounds on his head and face, received during a fight early today in his laundry with a white woman companion. The woman, who says she is Mollie Donovan, 22 years old, of Philadelphia, is in a dangerous condition in a hospital from several deep cuts in her head and shoulders, and is a prisoner on the charge of causing the Chinese man's death.

Kee in a statement made to the police before he died in a hospital told the police that the woman assaulted him with a cleaver while he was asleep, and claimed that he inflicted her wounds in defending himself.

UNIONIST MORRISON BEATEN.

Results of Newfoundland Elections 25 to 5 for Government.

St. John's, Nfld., Nov. 4.—Completed returns from Twillingate show the election of Premier Sir Robert Bond, Surveyor-General Clift and Mr. Robert Edwards, defeating Alan Goodridge, Donald Morrison and Frederick Mews, oppositionists. Mr. Morrison is a former judge of the supreme court. He resigned two years ago to re-enter politics and advocate the union of Newfoundland with Canada. Mr. Morrison is grand master of the Grange Association in Newfoundland, and is one of the five Tory leaders opposing Premier Bond. This defeat is a signal one, because Mr. Morrison was only fifth in the polling, his colleague, Mr. Goodridge, heading him. The government now has twenty-five seats and the opposition five.

INFANTRY CHARGES MOB.

Six Persons Killed During Parade of Protesters in Poland.

Breslau, Prussian Silesia, Nov. 4.—Three thousand Poles marched through the streets of Czesochowa, Russian Poland, Wednesday, as a protest against the mobilization. The chief of police and gendarmes ordered the parade to disperse, but they refused to do so and continued to sing Polish songs. A detachment of infantry then charged the mob, with bayoneted rifles, the result that six persons were killed and twenty were wounded.

PUBLIC OWNERSHIP.

Hamilton Herald: It cannot fairly be claimed that the principle of public ownership of railways was condemned at the polls yesterday by the people of Canada, altho the opposition leader made it the chief plank in his platform and he went down to defeat. In Ontario, the most enlightened province in the Dominion, there is a freer play of public opinion than in any other province. On the question of public ownership of railways, moreover, the people were more at liberty to express an honest opinion than were the people of provinces where large immediate and direct benefits are expected from the C. P. Pacific. When we consider that the cutting off of six constituencies in Ontario and the redistribution of the remaining eighty-six gave the Liberal party an advantage which they had not had in any former election for more than twenty years, the fact that Ontario has elected a considerable majority of Conservatives is pretty good evidence that Mr. Borden's railway policy is favored by a majority of the Ontario and the redistribution of the Ontario go, the majority in the Dominion are sure to go, sooner or later.

Car Collides With Wagon. Pittsburgh, Nov. 4.—A runaway car on the Pittsburgh, McKeessport & Connellville Railway dashed down Hamilton Avenue in McKeesport to-day and collided with a coal wagon. Thomas F. Moran, the motorman, who had lost control, was crushed to death. Five passengers were injured, none seriously.

ORPHANS TO BE RETURNED.

Roosevelt Interferes in Cases of Children Taken From the Sisters.

Prescott, Arizona, Nov. 4.—Attorney General Wells of Arizona has received a private letter from Phoenix, stating that Governor Brodie has sent orders for Clifton and Moreland while people, they have the matter before the president. They allege that most of the forty orphans are now in the custody of disreputable people, some being keepers of grog shops and of houses of ill-repute.

Forty orphans were brought from New York to be placed with Mexican families. They were taken by force from the Mexicans by whites, the latter threatening to lynch an agent of the sisters. The governor is said to fear trouble when he tries to take the children, and has instructed Capt. Ryzing of the Arizona Rangers at Douglas to be ready to quell any disturbance that may arise.

FOG ENVELOPES NEW YORK.

Ferry Columbia Sunk by Norwich Liner on the River.

New York, Nov. 4.—A thick blanket of fog which settled down over New York City and harbor during the night seriously disarranged traffic both by land and water early today and resulted in at least one serious accident when the river ferry boat Columbia, of the Wallstreet line, was run into and sunk by the Norwich liner City of Lowell. All of the passengers were saved, being taken on board the City of Lowell, but a number of horses which were being taken across the river went down with the boat and were lost. On the harbor and in the rivers craft of all kinds moved only with the greatest care, and delay was evident in every quarter. The city elevated and surface cars suffered serious delay, and schedules were practically abandoned. On the elevated lines the dense fog made it impossible for the engineers to distinguish signals at any distance, and as a consequence the trains which usually make fast time during the rush hours were driven very slowly, and thousands of persons were late in reaching their destinations. In the outlying sections where the elevated trains take the surface tracks even later trouble was met with and many annoying delays resulted.
