faction. This increase has been, no doubt, in part due to the chang of the Week of Intercession and consequent occurrence of two period for Mission Services in the year.

Salary of the Bishop of Algoma.—The Board respectfully wishes draw attention to a section of a letter addressed by the Diocesan to Synod at its last session. The passage is as follows: "It is my duty apprise you that I was informed in Montreal that each Diocese we expected to contribute annually \$200 to the salary of the Bishop of Algoma, and that our Diocese was the only one which had not so contribute I had never heard of such an agreement before, nor do I know how to sum can be provided. But if the Synod should think fit to pass a rest tion on the subject, I can only say that I will readily co-operate in a practical measure to accomplish the end proposed. The sums hither collected in this Diocese have been given to Missionary objects in Diocese of Algoma, not to the salary of the Bishop."

No definite action having been taken by the Synod, the Board feels liberty to state the facts of the case, as well as to express an opinion

It was by the deliberate action of the five Dioceses of the Eccles tical Province of Canada, first in Diocesan Synod, and then, by the representatives in Provincial Synod, that the Missionary Diocesan Algoma was formally set apart from the Diocese of Toronto, with express understanding that the Bishop and Missionary Staff should supported by these five Dioceses. Bishop Fauquier was elected a special session of the Provincial Synod in September, 1873, the following Dioceses being represented, viz: Quebec, Toronto, Montreal, Humand Ontario. It was not until July, 1874, that the Diocese of Fred ton united itself with the Provincial Synod of Canada.

Bearing this in mind, the Board, while most anxious to help in its branches Church work in Algoma, most respectfully declined recognize any *claims*, and can only urge the wants of this Mission field as one of its many voluntary undertakings.

The Board gladly circulated among the Clergy of the Diocese altoral Letter from the Canadian Bishops, dated May 1st, 1879, in with they "earnestly call upon all, both clergymen and laymen, according their ability, systematically and continuously to give of their worksubstance to the Missionary Fund of the Diocese of Algoma."
