

T.R.C. Doubles Score on Brantford

Senior C. L. A. Lacrosse Game at
Island is Easy Win for Oremmen
—The Score 6 to 3.

ISLAND STADIUM, June 17.—(Staff Correspondence).—It was almost two o'clock when the ball was faced for the Senior C. L. A. game between Brantford and Toronto Rowing Club on Saturday afternoon. The early hour at which the game was played to start, and the prospects of the big N. L. U. game afterwards, made the attendance rather slim.

Enthusiasm, however, was on hand on all sides. Both teams appeared in the pink of condition, and it was hard to judge which had the advantage.

Tie in First Quarter.
First Quarter—Early in the first quarter Brantford began to rush the play, and kept the ball most of the time in T. R. C. territory. After some nice passing Duncan got the ball and scored the first goal for Brantford after seven minutes of play. Play continued about even, but the Oremmen woke up considerably, and evened up the score on a straight shot by Hynes. Time 15 minutes. Neither team scored again in this quarter. Score: Brantford 1, T. R. C. 1.

Playing It Close.
Second Quarter—T. R. C. showed up better in this quarter. Play was about even during the first few minutes, till Langton got the ball and scored. Brantford run up field scored for Brantford four minutes after play recommenced. T. R. C. again evened up the score.
