The Lectures of the Toronto School of Medicine, during the approaching Session, will commence on Tuesday the 1st of October next. They will be delivered in the Medical School Building of the University of Toronto, situated in University Park.

Students of the Toronto School of Medicine will be enabled, from their proximity, to avail themselves of the advantages afforded by the University Library and Museum.

During the past year, the Medical Museum of the Toronto University has been placed in charge of the Toronto School of Medicine, and additions are constantly being made to it by the Faculty.

The Chemical Lecture Room and Laboratory of University College are provided with every modern improvement, and the greatest facilities are offered for the study of both Theoretical and Practical Chemistry, under the able direction of Professor Croft.

The Dissecting Room, amply furnished with material, will be under the immediate control of Dr. Lizars, formerly Demonstrator of Anatomy in the University of Edinburgh. Numerous Anatomical Preparations, Models and Diagrams, for the purposes of illustration, afford every possible facility for the convenient study of General and Descriptive Anatomy. The Dissecting Room will be open from the 1st of September. The subjects of Physiology and Pathology will be amply illustrated by the Microscope—the Lecturers on these subjects having supplied themselves with superior instruments and the necessary microscopical preparations.

The aid granted to the Toronto School of Medicine by the Provincial Parliament, together with the annually increasing revenue from Students, has enabled the Faculty to procure a very valuable collection of illustrative models, made in Paris, and which cost nearly \$1500; these will add materially to the facilities that Students have hitherto enjoyed for the study of Pathological Anatomy.

A carefully selected collection of specimens of Medicinal substances will furnish ample opportunity to the Students for obtaining a familiar acquaintance with each subject lectured upon by the Lecturer upon *Materia Medica*.

The Toronto Lying-in Hospital furnishes abundant Obstetrical facilities to those Students who have attended one Course of Midwifery, on payment of a fee of \$5 for six months, or \$8 for one year. Clinical Instruction will be given to Students attending this Hospital, two Wards having been set apart for the especial treatment of uterine diseases.

The Toronto Dispensary is open to Students of Medicine, the Medical attendants being Drs. Wright, Thorburn, Lizars, O'Dea, Bull and Hall.

The Toronto General Hospital is open to Students, on payment of a fee of \$8 for six months, or \$10 for one year. Clinical Instruction will be given by Drs. Hodder, Aikins, and Richardson. Operations on Saturday at 1 p.m.

At the University Examination in 1860, seven Students of this School obtained Scholarships of the value of \$120 each. The Gold Medal and four Silver Medals were also carried off by pupils of the Toronto School of Medicine.

At the last Examination, in 1861, seven Scholarships, the Gold Medal, and one Silver Medal, constituting all the honors awarded by the University, were adjudged to Students of this School.

Candidates for Degrees in Medicine will readily appreciate the numerous advantages, together with the honor to be derived by Graduation in the Provincial University; at the same time, the Toronto School of Medicine offers every facility to those gentlemen who contemplate obtaining the Provincial License, by undergoing the Examination before the Provincial Board of Examiners. Lectures will commence on Tuesday, 1st October, 1861.

The fee for the Courses on General and Descriptive Anatomy, Surgery, *Materia Medica*, Practice of Medicine, Midwifery, and Institutes of Medicine, \$12 each (on each of these branches not less than 100 lectures will be delivered); Surgical Anatomy, \$4; Chemistry and Botany, \$5 each; for Medical Jurisprudence and Demonstrations, \$8 each. Registration Fee, \$2. Fees to be paid strictly in advance.
