FF ANYTHING was needed to show how clearly and decisively Charlie Gorman outclassed the field at the world's championship skating meet here a few weeks ago, it is the results of the U. S. national and international meets at Binghampton and Detroit, respectively. At the former meet, O'Neil Farrell, Chicago, managed to nose out into first place with 70 points, just 10 points ahead of Paul Forsman and Morris. Place that alongside of Gorman's count of 140 points at Lily Lake where the stakes were the greatest they have ever been in modern speed-skating on this continent and you get a faint idea of how good our own local ace is. The nearest to him was Farrell, just 60 pionts behind him. At Detroit, Bialis won the international crown with 110 points, followed by Reed with 90 points, a difference of 20 points. That also hardly compares with Gorman's score of 140 points. It is doubtful if a world's championship was ever won by a wider margin than that rolled up by Gorman here and certainly no major championship in recent years has been corralled by that score. It must further be remembered that Gorman was the marked man at Lily Lake. All recognized him as the man to beat and his every move was tallied. Yet, he jumped to the front right at the start and never was headed, despite the mental upset given him on the second day. Undoubtedly, his score would have been larger had he been feeling right on that day. He came in from the lake on that second day, not feeling downcast because Farrell had tied him but rather bitter over the stand he had beeen forced to take. Hardly the frame of mind to tackle the final day's work. But he overcame those obstacles in such a crashing and positive manner by winning the 440 and 5-mile on the final day as to leave absolutely no room for doubt as to his superiority over the entire pack. Gorman skated Farrell off his feet in the three-quarter on the second day and although Farrell won, it proved a costly victory. That was where Gorman proved his championship class. He possessed the tremendous comeback and reserve necessary for the grand

He has fully lived up to everything that was expected of him when he joined the squad and the only danger is that he is so good that some scout is going to report his good work to the bigger teams and Saint John may lose him. ·Hallisey and Gilbert have been stonewalls on defence, the veteran never shining better than this year.
