

## FOSTER AND HAYES NAMED BY SAINT JOHN-ALBERT LIBERAL ELECTORS; 6 OTHERS DECLINE

New Minister Chosen, Tells  
Aim to Work for Good  
of Province

MEIGHEN PROPOSAL  
IS "DOLE," HE CLAIMS

Maritime Case, Immigration,  
Courtenay Bay Plans  
Favored

HON. W. E. FOSTER, Secretary of State, and R. T. Hayes, former M. L. A. for Saint John, were unanimously chosen as the standard bearers for the Liberal party for the constituency of Saint-John and Albert at the Liberal convention held in the Magee Building in Charlotte street last evening. Several other names were brought up last evening, but the nominees declined to allow their names to go before the convention. The meeting was a representative one with a large attendance of delegates not only from Saint John city and county but also from Albert County. Dr. L. M. Curran was chairman. The meeting was an enthusiastic one and Hon. Dr. Foster delivered a fine speech in which he outlined the work the Government was doing at Courtenay Bay, the stand taken in favor of disposing of the Portland, Me., terminals, the way in which he had secured the high tariff had ruined the Maritime Provinces and the need of markets for the produce of this section which, he said, was even more important at present than the need of immigrants here.

**RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED.**  
Speeches were also given by Dr. L. M. Curran, Dr. W. P. Broderick, Hon. Dr. Roberts, R. E. Armstrong, E. J. Kenneberry, secretary of the Liberal executive for the constituency; Col. Alexander McMillan, W. M. Ryan and others. Resolutions expressing confidence in Rt. Hon. Mackenzie King and Hon. Dr. Foster were passed. Owing to the absence of R. T. Hayes from the city he did not address the delegates.

In a few opening remarks Dr. Curran urged the delegates to get together and see that the city was represented in the council chamber by electing the newly appointed Secretary of State and help the Liberal Government carry out its program of development here which would help the city over the next few years of readjustment of conditions the business of nomination was undertaken.

**THOSE NOMINATED.**  
Col. Alex. McMillan nominated Hon. W. E. Foster, seconded by W. A. Ross, R. E. Armstrong nominated Dr. Broderick, seconded by A. Neil McLean. Louis McDonald nominated Fred M. Thompson, Albert county, seconded by W. M. Campbell. F. M. Thompson nominated R. T. Hayes, seconded by John T. O'Brien. Daniel Haggerty nominated Col. Alexander McMillan. George Gray nominated Hon. Dr. Roberts, seconded by Joseph Dryden. J. E. Tighe nominated Dr. Curran, seconded by John McKinnon. Dr. J. E. Gossnell nominated Dr. Emery. All these mentioned except the two





chosen representatives asked that their names be withdrawn as they would be unable to accept the nomination for various reasons. The convention by a standing vote unanimously endorsed Hon. Dr. Foster and Mr. Hayes as Liberal candidates for Saint John-Albert and the province.

**TELLS LIBERAL SLOGAN.**  
In nominating Dr. Broderick, Mr. Armstrong made a short speech, saying that in a recent article Premier King had said that the Liberal Government policy could be summed up in the slogan "talk, moderation and progress." He urged greater unity, especially in the Maritime Provinces.

E. J. Henneberry also spoke briefly, urging that the Liberal workers go into the fight with a spirit of unity and put their shoulders to the wheel and return the two men who had been tried in the balance and found worthy of public support by their splendid work on previous occasions. He expressed confidence that the verdict given by the people of Canada on election day would sustain the Liberal party.

### DR. FOSTER SPEAKS

Hon. Dr. Foster was greeted with a tremendous ovation as he rose to speak. He said that he might have been in another constituency, but he had worked all his life in Saint John and he wanted to carry on his fight where he lived among his friends. He declared that he had always worked for the best interests of Saint John and the province.

Referring to Dr. Broderick, he paid a tribute to the man who had carried the Liberal standard on two previous occasions. Referring to his colleagues Mr. Hayes he declared that he had been associated with the latter for years and he had always found him in the forefront of any work for the good of the city. He pointed out that Mr. Hayes had only consented to permit his name to come up on the strong urging of friends as his health was not good.

### NEEDS TO BE ELECTED.

In accepting the cabinet position Hon. Dr. Foster said that he intended to work for the welfare of the people of the province and of Canada generally. To hold his position, he pointed out, it was necessary that he be elected so that it was of vital importance if the constituency wished to have a cabinet post here that they work in harmony. With such a spirit manifest he did not doubt that the verdict would be favorable on election day.

Recently, he said, the city had a visit from Hon. Mr. Meighen and that gentleman brought his full supply of pessimism and gloom with him. His policies would not right conditions here by his own admission so a "dole" was to be handed out from the treasury instead. He felt that the people of the Maritime Provinces were not going to be bought off in that manner.

### SEES LIBERALS WIN.

In the last House, he continued, the Meighen forces in parliament numbered 51 and he did not think it possible that the Conservative Party could pick up 79 additional seats at the polls this time. He predicted that the Liberal Party would again be the strongest one in the next House, and Hon. Mr. King would continue as Premier, so it behooved this section to help give the party a clear majority so Canada could have stable government.

Thus when appropriations for New Brunswick were wanted, either for the harbor or other purposes, when legislation is desired to lighten the burdens of taxation and measures advo-

### Resolutions

Moved by W. M. Ryan and seconded by Dr. S. B. Smith:  
**Resolved**, That the people of this constituency strongly appreciate the move that has been made and brought about largely through the efforts of the Secretary of State, Hon. W. E. Foster, to construct additional facilities at the port of Saint John on the east and west side of the harbor for that export and import business we deem to be so important for the future of this commercial centre. We also desire to express our great satisfaction at the selection of Hon. W. E. Foster, whom we have nominated as a Federal candidate tonight, to the honorable position of one of the cabinet of Right Hon. Mackenzie King. His knowledge of the needs of the port as well as his thorough acquaintance with the necessities of the Maritime Provinces will enable him to so represent us in the councils of the country that we can look forward with greater confidence to his play at the hands of the central government.

ated for the general interest of the country the Government will have complete power and not be dependent on any group for support. Thus the onus of each act was placed strictly up to the Government and they could face the issue better.

**REFERS TO EDITORIAL.**  
Referring to a recent editorial in the Times-Star headed "Let Them Be Heard" in which it was suggested that the people of the province should know beyond any doubt when nominating candidates where they stand on the question of justice to the Maritime Provinces. Taking up the matter of utilizing Canadian ports the speaker said that every person knew that this had always been his support. The matter of immigration was one to which he heartily subscribed, he declared. However, he added, that he had found in the local legislature when expenditures for immigrants was discussed some former representative had always got up and declared that there were not enough markets at present for their products and that this was a matter to be remedied before the question of further immigrants was considered.

### VALLEY RAILWAY STAND.

Regarding the Valley Railway, Dr. Foster said that his stand on this regard was well known. He had declared that the Liberal and Tory Governments to take over this road, thus relieving the people of the province of the burden. He declared if sent to Ottawa he would continue to urge it and he added that he could do this better from the inside as a cabinet minister than as an ordinary citizen.

Taking up the railway question, he declared that Mr. Meighen had expressed himself in favor of keeping the Portland, Me., terminals. He remarked that the Conservative party had struck this blow at this port in the first place and now they calmly came here and expressed themselves in favor of keeping them.

"I say get rid of them, for so long as they remain they are a temptation to the railway men who will want to use them for Canadian trade. Get rid of them at the first opportunity in my idea," he announced.

### DENIES ELECTION DODGE.

Turning to the matter of better facilities here the speaker remarked that some persons were saying that the work started here was only an "election dodge." The four new berths

with the grain elevator with a capacity of a million bushels at Courtenay Bay was no election dodge, he stated, but a determined effort on the part of the Government to provide facilities here to attract shipping so that regular lines would operate out of this port and thus enable western shippers to be sure of adequate service without delay via Canadian winter ports.

The speaker proceeded and read a certified copy of the order-in-council passed last month at Ottawa for the port at Courtenay Bay. While only \$300,000 had been voted as yet the amount of money needed would be voted as the work went on until this unit was completed.

**FREIGHT RATES ISSUE.**  
Referring next to the freight rates the speaker pointed out that this matter was in the hands of the railway commission, and he was confident of its application to all persons and locations so as to permit freest possible interchange of commodities between various provinces and territories of Dominion and expansion of its trade, foreign and domestic, having regard to needs of its agricultural and other basic industries and in particular (A) The claim asserted on behalf of the Maritime Provinces that they are entitled to restoration of rate basis which they enjoyed prior to 1919 and (B) The encouragement of movement of traffic through Canadian ports. This telegram showed, he said, how the Government was moving for fair railway rates.

### BLAMES DR. MLAREN.

Taking the matter of British Preference Dr. Foster declared that Dr. MacLaren, while a member of the house for this constituency, voted in 1924 against a proposal of a further preference of 10 per cent. on British goods if brought through Canadian ports in spite of the fact that he himself had realized that the new act would mean additional work for the port workers of this city. He felt that Dr. MacLaren would have to answer to the citizens for this act of playing party politics against the interests of his own constituency.

In concluding his remarks Dr. Foster said that he was not forgetting the C. P. R. and all it had done for the port. He intended to see that the west side terminals were not neglected. He pointed to the increased potato and cattle shipments through the port in the last few years and said that increased facilities had already helped to increase the movement and the future of the port was bright. He felt that the West Indies treaty would be of great benefit to this port.

He paid a special tribute to Hance Logan and the part he had played in getting the West Indies trade agreement passed at Ottawa.

The meeting closed with cheers for the candidates.

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
