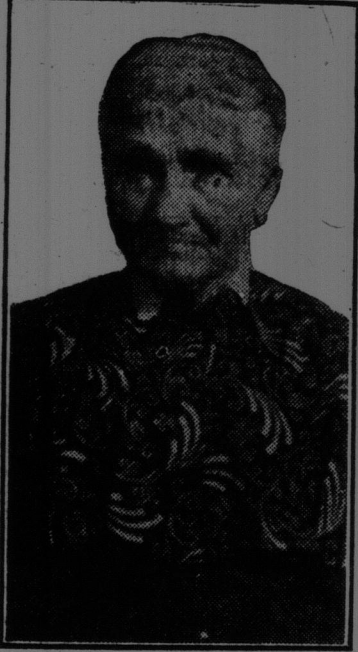


Nears Century Mark

Mrs. Margaret Porter Born
in Tyrone, Ireland,
in 1834

Chipman, N. B., Nov. 7.—An event of more than ordinary interest took place at Chipman on Monday, October 27, when Mrs. Margaret Porter celebrated her ninetieth birthday. Born in County Tyrone, Ireland, in 1834, the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Fowler, she came to this country in the year 1858 with her parents, sailing from Londonderry to St. John, and from thence traveling part by boat up the St. John River and through Grand Lake, and part on foot to the site of their future home on the Salmon River Creek. What is now a prosperous farming district, was then forest country, families of Porters and Watsons with Mr. Fowler's family, forming the first settlement of that area.

which united two of those original families, when she married William Porter. There being no clergyman in the district at that time, the happy pair journeyed down the river on a woodboat to St. John where the marriage was solemnized by the late Rev. Dr. Bennett.

Upon their return Mr. and Mrs. Porter took up a piece of land near to the homes of their parents, at what has since proved to be one of the most desirable positions in the whole district, and together toiled amid what to our age would appear to be unsurmountable difficulties in an effort to improve the land and establish a home. That the effort was crowned with success has long since been common knowledge in the community in which for many years their home was the centre of much of the social life of these early years.

Of the six children born in the home, two died in infancy and one, Robinson, died on the old homestead in May, 1914. Mrs. Isaac Hutchinson, of St. John, Mrs. John MacAllister, of Salmon Creek, and William Porter, of Boston, Mass., are the remaining members of the family. Following the death of her husband in August, 1902, Mrs. Porter made her home with her son, Robinson, until his death, after which she removed to Chipman, where her son, William, had built one of the nicest homes of the town for her comfort, and where, with Mrs. Robinson Porter and family, she is enjoying the retiring years of life.

Of Mrs. Porter's grandchildren, in whom she has always taken the greatest delight, Lieut. Everett Porter was killed in action in 1916, and Miss Margaret Porter is at present on the teaching staff of the Provincial Normal College in Fredericton. There are six other grandchildren and two little great-grandchildren.

For many years Mrs. Porter has been a consistent member of the Chipman Presbyterian congregation. During her earlier years the church at Salmon Creek was the worshiping place of a large number of the people of the congregation, and there she found expression for her strong faith and never failing good works, and in the declining

years of her life she is still actively interested in the life and work of the Chipman church, in which she is still frequently found at worship at suitable seasons of the year, although her age makes it necessary for her to conserve her splendid energy as much as possible.

Her son, William, who makes several visits each year to see his mother, motored from Boston to be present upon the occasion of her ninetieth birthday, and a number of the people of the community called upon her during the day to offer hearty congratulations.

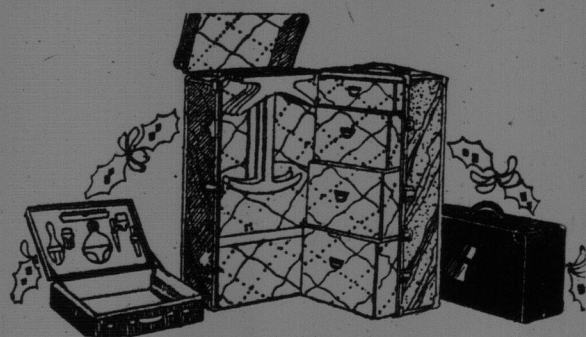
