WOMEN DOUBLE

City Voters.

The extension of the franchise to women by the Provincial Government has practically doubled the work of the revisors of the city of St. John and added about 100 p. c. to the number of those who are entitled to cast a vote for the local representatives at Fredericton. The new assessment law has also been responsible for the addition of a large number of ladies to the list of ratepayers in the city, as under it the women have to pay on income and receive only the same exemption as men. This exemption is \$400 on incomes up to \$1,200, and \$200 on incomes from \$1,200 to \$1,500.

In 1918, the last year in which the old assessment act applied, the number of female ratepayers was 1,566, and this year the number has increased to 3,820, an increase of about 60 per cent. due to the operation of the new act.


