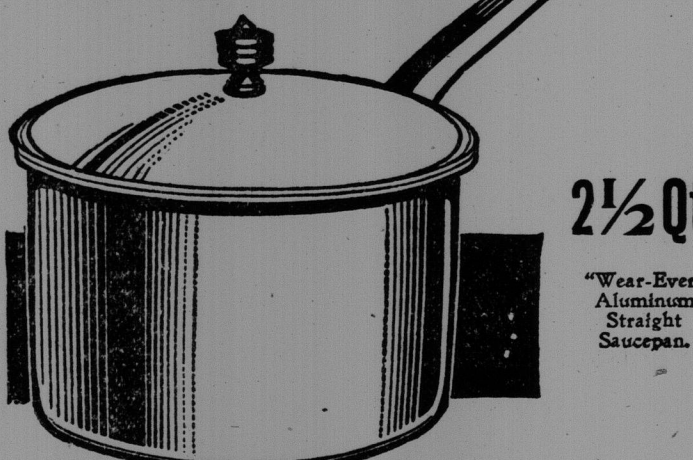

EGGS 80 CENTS IN MARKET TODAY

They Were Selling, Too—Rabbits in Quantity—Turkey 50 Cents.

Eighty cents a dozen was the price asked for fresh eggs at the city market this morning and—eaten at the price—they were in great demand.

There was a fairly good quantity of poultry to be had and the prices were reasonable. Turkeys were asked at 40 cents a pound; geese and ducks at 40 cents; chickens at 35 and fowl at 30 cents.

The vegetable supply was also good and the prices moderate. Tomatoes were 20 cents a pound; celery, 10 cents a bunch; cucumbers, 20 cents each; squash, 6 cents a pound; lettuce, 10 cents a head. Potatoes showed a slight drop from last week, retailing at 2 to 2 1/2 cents a pound.
