SAY DROP IN PRICES HARD ON U. S. FARMERS

Washington, Oct. 5.—Reductions during July and August in the prices of various farm products cost the farmers of the United States approximately \$1,750,000,000, it was estimated today by George P. Hampton, managing director of the Farmers' National Council. The estimate was based on the prices received for wheat, corn, potatoes, apples, cotton and beef cattle.

"Under the present system of distribution of farm products," Mr. Hampton declared in a statement, "it is clear that farmers gave no assurance of costs of production plus a fair profit."

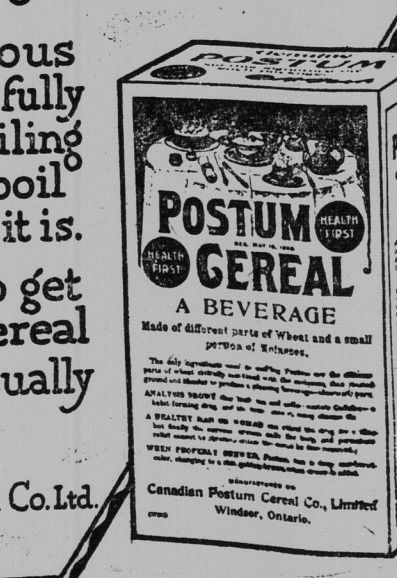
