# Will a Slaughter of Jews Be Next European Horror?

While the sporadic persecutions and massacres of Jews in Russia, Poland, Roumania, and the Ukraine, already reported, are disturbing in themselves, they are but scattered sparks compared to the conflagration some observers foresee. Thus William G. Shepherd, in a Paris dispatch to the New York Evening Post says that not only leading Jews in France but even notable Russian authorities, including Kerensky, "admit the possibility that the next Russian horror will consist of attacks on Jews." In the course of a dispatch from Paris a correspondent to the New York Day, a Jewish paper, says regarding the massacres in the Ukraine that "the purpose is apparently to exterminate the entire Jewish

Regarding the reported persecution of Jews in Poland, Rev. Dr. H. Pereira Mendes, of New York, declares that that country "is now at the bar of the world's judgment, for the world has to choose between Turkish atrocities in Armenia, German atrocities in Belgium, and Polish atrocities in

Poles in New York, and the new Polish Premier Paderewski, deny that pogroms have occurred in Poland, and characterize these charges as anti-Polish and pro-German propaganda. To substantiate these denials the Polish Information Bureau cites Dr. Vernon Kellogg, recently returned to New York from Poland, who in an interview published in the New York Times stated that while "there were constant rumors of difficulties of one kind and another between the Jews and the Poles," he did not find evidence of any widespread massacres.
