DIME-STEAD LAWS

WILL BE CHANGED

on W. J. Roche Promises Greater Encouragement For Cattle Raising in Canada

Winnipeg, Sept. 18.—Changes in the dime-stead laws, looking to the encouragement of cattle-raising were introduced by Hon. W. J. Roche, who

has just spent a month in the west. During his trip the minister was waited on by many deputations representing the ranchers. In speaking of their requests he says: "I cannot but feel that some changes are desirable. It is our policy to encourage the cattle-raising industry throughout Canada, and there is reason to believe that some amendments to the dime-stead laws are desirable. I expect that amendments will be introduced permitting settlers to get patents on their lands by stocking cattle." Dr. Roche will take up the St. Peter's Indian reserve case with a deputation from Selkirk. He claims that the crop is the best in the history of the west.

CALGARY CLAIMS POPULATION OF CLOSE TO 90,000

Calgary, Alta., Sept. 18.—That the population of Calgary is now close to 90,000 is the estimate of a directory company in issuing its annual directory of this city. The growth of the city is perhaps no better indicated than in the increase of the school population. For the first two days of the school session which opened the first of the month the enrollment in Protestant public schools of Calgary was 6,748. The number registering at the opening of last year was 4,960. At the close of the school year last June the enrollment was 5,975. The school, of course, has great difficulty in coping with this growth and new school buildings are constantly required to accommodate the pupils.
