Ten thousand dollars was the reported loss in a disastrous fire which swept a portion of Truro, Nova Scotia, yesterday, destroying the sample rooms of the Waverly Hotel, ice house, livery stable, fuel sheds, poultry houses, a large store and dwelling and a house. The house was valued at \$6,000. The loss is partly covered by insurance.

An automobile, driven by Walter Ross and owned by his father, Frank T. Ross, of St. Stephen, ran down and instantly killed at Princeton, Me., yesterday, Della, the six-year-old child of John Morrison. It was the first fatal auto accident to be recorded in that vicinity.

Another tragedy of the loaded gun in the hands of children was reported yesterday from Houlton, Me., where a twelve-year-old child died as the result of her brother accidentally discharging her gun at her head when trying to mend it. The accident occurred in the Weeksboro woods.
