

WIGMORE FOR COMMISSIONER

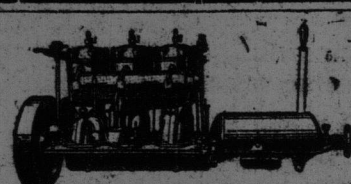
Mr. Voter:
