SCHOOL BOARD GIVES

PLACE FOR EVERY DAY CLUB PLAY GROUNDS

Aberdeen Grounds to be Utilized—Meeting of The Trustees Last Night

At a meeting of the school board last night a resolution was passed allowing the use of the Aberdeen school playground to the Every Day Club as a supervised playground during the vacation. The members of the Women's Council will also be granted the use of the Centennial playground this year if they desire it. A good deal of the time of the meeting was taken up discussing the question whether the board would allow the use of the High school assembly rooms for an informal dance to be given by the High school alumni to the graduating class. The matter was finally decided by a vote of four to three in favor of granting the request.

A. M. Belding, president of the Every Day Club, appealed for use of the Aberdeen school grounds for a supervised playground, promising the grounds and equipment would be left in as good condition as when taken over.

Following the confirmation of the minutes of the previous meeting twelve applications were received for positions on the teaching staff. These were from Miss Rhel G. Brown, Silver Falls; Miss Rhelma Steves, Fredericton; Miss Bertha E. Estabrooks, Fredericton; Miss G. E. Knowlton, Fredericton; Dorothy S. Purdy, Westfield; Miss Constance Cooper, of this city; Fred G. Squires, Cambridge (Mass.); Miss J. Maud G. Estey, Milltown; Miss Jennie May Wood, York county, and J. E. Bryan. All of these were placed on the application book.

The resignation of John G. McKinnon of the Douglas Avenue school was accepted, as he explained that he wished to take a college course. The request of Miss Mary Nannery, who for thirty-eight years has been a teacher for six months' leave of absence on account of ill-health, was granted with full pay.

The question of asking teachers eligible for superannuation to accept it, came up and a report at the next meeting.

An application from Miss Phoebe Vanwart of the High School staff for \$100 increase was referred to the teachers' committee. An invitation from the graduates' class for the board to be present at an at home to be given, was accepted, and request from the graduates' class for a request from John Kerr that there was no window in the clock room, was referred to the architect.

It was decided to hear members of the Tuberculosis Association regarding medical inspection in the schools at the next meeting. An application for the use of the Bell building was referred to a committee. The matter of school saving banks was deferred till the return of Dr. Bridges. On the representation of the West Side was referred to the manual training committee. The planer of awarding the Corporation Medal came up, and Dr. Bridges suggested that it be competed for by all pupils in the public schools doing grade XI work. The secretary's report showed an enrollment of 7,288 pupils.

Daily Hints For the Cook

ORANGE JELLY.

Soak one-half a box of gelatine in one quart cup of cold water until soft; then add one-half cupful of boiling water, the juice of half a lemon, one half a cupful of powdered sugar, and one cupful of orange juice; stir all together, strain and put away to harden.

DELICATE CAKE.

Three cupfuls of flour, two of sugar, three-fourths cupful of sweet milk, whites of six eggs, half a cupful of cream, one spoonful of cream tartar, one half teaspoonful of soda. Flavor with lemon.

GINGER COOKIES.

One-half cup butter, one-half cup lard, one and one-half cups sugar, two eggs, one level tablespoon each of ginger, cinnamon and soda, flour to roll. Cream the butter and lard and add the sugar gradually, then the eggs well beaten. Sift the spices and add with two cups of flour and add with enough more flour to roll out. Cut into shapes and bake in the whole mass.

MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

The flight of aeroplanes over the county of London during the coronation festivities is prohibited. The penalty is a fine of \$100 or six months' imprisonment.

Mulali-El-Zin, the Moroccan pretender, has surrendered to the French forces.

Ottawa, June 12—There is an unconfirmed rumor in circulation here that the new British Canadian Shipbuilding Company, of which Sir Henry Pellatt is chairman, is almost certain to secure the bulk of the contracts for the building of the vessels of the new Canadian navy.

Ottawa, June 12—Dr. C. E. Gooding, of the Barbados legislature, who is in Ottawa

today, states that there is every indication that reciprocity between Canada and the West Indies was a thing of the near future.

Montreal, June 12—Cy Warman, of the Grand Trunk, has received from Boston a box containing 100,000 names of persons, inhabitants of the New England states, petitioning the Grand Trunk Railway to

extend its lines to the city of Boston. It is doubtful if such a numerously signed petition has even been seen in Montreal before.

Toronto, June 12—The Toronto Methodist conference carried church union this morning after a vigorous debate lasting three days, by a vote of 241 to 46.
