



SCHOOL BOARD GIVES PLACE FOR EVERY DAY **CLUB PLAY GROUNDS**

Aberdeen Grounds to be Utilized -Meeting of The Trustees Last

At a meeting of the school board last night a resolution was passed allowing the use of the Aberdeen school playgrounds to the Every Day Club as a supervised playground during the vacation. The members of the Women's Council will also be granted the use of the Centennial playground this year if they desire it. A good deal of the time of the meeting was taken up discussing the question whether the board would allow the use of the High school assembly rooms for an informal dance to be given by the High school alumni to the graduating class. The matter was finally decided by a vote of four to three in favor of granting the request. A. M. Belding, president of the Every Day Club, appealed for use of the Aberdeen school grounds for a supervised playground, promising the grounds and equipment would be left in as good condition as when taken over.
