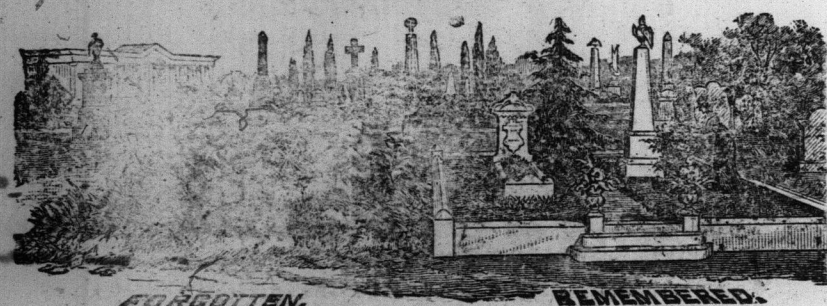

Might of Great Britain's Navy

(New York American.) Of all the nations caught into the mad maelstrom of this European war, Britain is safest. Britain is most secure—the most commanding figure of them all!

Ulster Rifles for the Allies

In aid of the British cause, and for the good of freedom and liberty throughout the world, the Ulster volunteers have contributed to the Allies' cause, if not all, of the German rifles they procured with so much trouble. They have yielded the weapons that were to have preserved for them the union with Great Britain. Though a month after was started the Asquith Government put the Home Rule Bill through the final stage, and the King thereupon attached his signature, the Ulster loyalists sacrificed for the good of the British cause the fruits of their difficult and risky "gun-running." They are now without the means to make effective their promise of resistance, even to the death, of the inclusion of Ulster in the Home Rule Government. Many of the volunteers have enlisted in Kitchener's second army, prepared not only to hazard Ulster's cause, but to give their own lives for the sake of Britain.

The noble and sincere patriots who could stand by the Empire so unflinchingly in time of trouble, even to their own hurt, surely deserve more consideration from the British Government and British people than cooperation into a hateful separation from Britain. Men of Ulster have been part of the flower of the British army. Their lives have counted to them as nothing in the service of King and country. But when they surrender the cause of Ulster into the hands of a Ministry that has hitherto been dominated by John Redmond they make a sacrifice far greater in their eyes than that of life alone. Premier Asquith has promised to introduce an amending bill, embodying concessions to the Ulstermen, the Home Rule Bill to be suspended during the duration of the war. It remains to be seen whether he and his colleagues will be as just to the Ulster volunteers as these have been patriotic and sacrificing. There is a ray of hope that the defenceless condition of Ulster, when the Home Rule settlement is again up, will not be taken advantage of to carry out designs that, if armed, Ulster would have resisted. This is in the action of Right Hon. Winston Churchill in making public, in a speech at Liverpool, as head of the navy, that Ulster rifles had been of high service to the Belgians in making sorties out of Antwerp. Ulster, at least, has done her full duty—Mail and Empire.

Volunteers as Chaplain

Letter to His Excellency
The Rectory, Forestville, Prince George's County, Maryland, Sept. 21st, 1914.

His Excellency Sir W. E. Davidson, K. C. M. G., Governor of Newfoundland and Dependencies, Your Excellency—I have just learned from the Newfoundland papers that you are raising a Regiment of Newfoundland boys for active service in the big war now being waged in Europe, and I am prompted to ask if you need a Chaplain for the troops that you will accept my services as a volunteer for the duty.

I have been living in the United States now for ten years as Rector of the Episcopal Church of the Epiphany, Forestville, P. C. G., Maryland, but I am of British birth. My father was a West Country Devonshire viking, my mother a Healey, one removed from the old sod; so I am half English, half Irish, the best mixture of blood in the world.

In years, I am not a young man, but I am young in constitution, health, strength and activity; sound in mind and limb, and in Newfoundland and on Labrador for more than forty years of missionary life. I went through the rough training which would fit me for the exposure and hardships of campaigning.

I shall be truly glad and supremely happy if I can be accepted for the service of the land of my fathers in the capacity of Chaplain, since I am debarr'd by my calling from shouldering the rifle or drawing the sword.

I shall be most grateful if your Excellency will give me a reply as soon as possible so that I may make the preparations necessary. If I am accepted.

Crews Told To Be Ready For New Vessels

London, Sept. 30.—Further details regarding the coming sea strength of Britain are now available. Under the names H. M. S. Erin and H. M. S. Agincourt, the two Dreadnoughts being built for Turkey, the Rasnadiak and the Oshial, which were taken over by the British Admiralty, are now almost completed, the one at Barrow and the other at Belfast. The latter is, in fact, almost ready for sea. The crews of both these vessels, which will carry 1412-inch guns, have already been told off.

Where Britain will have enormous superiority will be in battle cruisers. First and foremost comes the battle cruiser Tiger, now completing at the yard of Messrs. Brown & Co., Glasgow. She is a sister ship to the Queen Mary, and will have a speed of 30 knots. Of light cruisers there are sixteen all, with one exception, in the stage of completion. The exception is the Arethusa, which is at sea, and which has already distinguished herself. Fifteen others are building.

The one feature which makes these boats invaluable to the first battle squadron in the North Sea is that they are oil burning. This not only gives them the tremendous speed of 20 knots and enables the stokehold personnel to be very considerably reduced, but also enables them to remain continuously in the fighting line. All coal driven boats must leave for their base periodically for coal, beyond which it is a terribly exhausting process for the crew. With an oil driven ship all that is necessary is for an oil tanker to come alongside, screw on a hose and pump in the oil without disturbing a soul.

In destroyers we have fourteen and a flotilla leader building. These are vessels of from 700 to 1,300 tons displacement, burn oil only, and will have a speed of from 34 to 35 knots. Their armament is four 4 in. quick firing guns and four 21-in. torpedo tubes. The Nimrod, flotilla leader, is slightly larger.

That added to the details of the super dreadnaughts and the additional submarines strength now ordered is the coming sea strength of the Empire building at this moment.

Rates of Commission on Money Orders.

The rates of commission on Money Orders issued by any Money Order Office in Newfoundland to the United States of America, the Dominion of Canada and any part of Newfoundland, are as follows:
For sums not exceeding \$10 - 5 cts
Over \$10 but not exceeding \$20 - 10 cts
Over \$20 but not exceeding \$50 - 15 cts
Over \$50 but not exceeding \$100 - 20 cts
Over \$100 but not exceeding \$200 - 25 cts
Over \$200 but not exceeding \$500 - 30 cts
Over \$500 but not exceeding \$1,000 - 35 cts
Over \$1,000 but not exceeding \$5,000 - 40 cts
Over \$5,000 but not exceeding \$10,000 - 45 cts
Over \$10,000 but not exceeding \$100,000 - 50 cts
Maximum amount of a single Order to any of the above countries and at offices in Newfoundland, \$100, but as many may be obtained as the remitter requires.

NEWFOUNDLAND POSTAL TELEGRAPH SERVICE.

POSTAL TELEGRAPH OFFICES are operated throughout the Colony at all the principal places. Messages of ten words, not including address or signature, are forwarded for twenty cents, and two cents for each additional word. A Government cable to Canso, Cape Breton, connects with the Commercial Cable Co.'s system to all parts of the world. There is no more efficient Telegraph Service in existence.

A ten word message to Canada, exclusive of signature and address, costs from 85 cents to \$1.00. A ten word message to the United States, exclusive of signature and address, costs from \$1.10 to \$1.50. To Great Britain, France or Germany—85 cents per word.

Telegrams are transmitted by means of the Wireless Service during the summer season, and all the year round by Steamers equipped with the wireless apparatus, which are due to pass within the radius of the wireless stations at Cape Race and Cape Ray. Telegraph messages may be obtained at all Post Offices and from Mail Clerks on Trains and Steamers, and if the sender wishes the messages may be left with the P.M. to be forwarded by first mail to the nearest Telegraph Office free of postage.
