News Summary.

DOMINION. — The telephone line from Moncton to Dorchester is now open for business. — The Canadian Electric Co. of Amherst and the Amherst Light and Heat Co. have amalgamated.

— Lord Stanley will unveil the statue to the late Dr. Ryerson in the Toronto Normal School in May. — The assessable property of Montreal increased in value \$6,000,000 last year.

— R. W. Fraser, of Halifax, has resigned the presidency of the People's Bank of Halifax, and A. W. West has been elected in his place.

— Petitions are being circulated in Toronto in favor of high license, the fees suggested being: Hotels, one thousand dollars; saloons, twelve hundred; shops, six hundred.

— The Quebec Knights of Labor held a public meeting recently and passed resolutions, which they ordered to be sent to the local government, favoring universal suffrage.

— It is reported that Rev. A. C. Edwards, late pastor of the Methodist Church at Binsarch, has fallen heir to a million dollars by the death of an uncle in England.

— Alphonse Brouillette has recovered \$400 damages from the Montreal Street Railway Company for injuries received through forcible ejection from one of the company's cars.

— The B. C. Board of Trade has telegraphed to the Ottawa government their opinion that it is not desirable to increase the duty on flour as requested by the Ontario millers.

— The new wood working company at Port Elgin have purchased a piece of ground near the railway from Alex. Munro for a site for their factory, which will be commenced as soon as spring opens.

— The little steamer Loyalist, purchased by Messrs. Freeman and Cushing, to ply on Molega Lake, Queens Co., N. S., is now mounted on runners at Annapolis, awaiting more snow to enable her owners to get her there.

— The Victoria, B. C. Council has decided to extend the city limits half a mile beyond the present boundaries, much to the disgust of the large landed proprietors who were moving from the rural municipalities.

— The Lunenburg Progress has been informed that about 98 years ago one Andrew Taylor was born in the poor hamlet of Halifax, and on Friday last, the same unfortunate died in the poor house of Lunenburg county.

— The Halifax Chamber of Commerce seem to favor unrestricted sawdust dumping into streams and rivers. They contend that the expenditure of half a million dollars would be necessary to clean up if the law is enforced, which would be ruinous to mill owners.

— A terrible railway accident occurred last week at St. George, Ont., caused by the breaking of a driving rod on the engine. Nine people were killed outright, and over thirty were injured, several of whom have died since.

— A rumor is afloat that a new bridge will be constructed across the St. John at Woodstock. The new structure will span the river from the foot of King street, and stand over the head of Bull's Island. The old bridge which is now in a precarious condition will undoubtedly soon be abandoned.

— The steamer Stanley has temporarily stopped running between Fictor and Georgetown, to allow her boilers being overhauled, etc. She will be on the route again in a week or so, and in the meantime mails and passengers will be forwarded by ice boats between Cape Tormentine and Travers.

— Eliza Williams was lighting a fire at the residence of Mrs. Percy Murray, St. Hubert street, Montreal, when her clothing caught fire and the poor girl was soon enveloped in a mass of flames which were not extinguished before she was burned to death. The flesh in some places was burned to the bone.

— On Sunday, while pumping water for baptism in the Baptist church at Collingwood, Ont., the top of the pump, which was situated inside of the building, was blown off by natural gas. The windows and doors were immediately thrown open and due precautions taken to prevent the gas from taking fire. The gas rushed from the well with great force, but from the uncertain size of the pipe, it was almost impossible to estimate the quantity that escaped.

— The many friends of the Dominion Safety Fund Life Association of St. John, N. — The St. John carnival on Wednesday was a great success. Many business establishments took part in the procession. McAvity & Sons sent six teams; the Bell cigar factory, four; Manchester, Robertson & Allison, three. There were many unique representations. The N. B. G. A. had six or eight teams with light field guns and represented the passage of the British troops through St. John in 1861. About fifty gentlemen took individual parts in the parade. There were two processions, one in the afternoon and the other in the evening. Altogether it was a very creditable affair and the head ones should feel gratified at their success.

— Fire was discovered in the P. E. Island hospital Friday morning about 9:45 o'clock. The larger portion of the building was badly damaged by the fire and water. There were a large number of patients in the hospital at the time, but all were removed, without any apparent injury, to private dwellings in the vicinity. The fire started in the attic and it is supposed from defective fire. There was insurance on the building to the amount of \$2,500, and on the furniture \$500, but this amount will hardly cover the loss. Two seasons ago an addition was made to the building. This part of it has not been damaged much.

— The customs receipts for February were \$128,000, an increase of \$30,000. — The Fredericton exchange of the N. B. Telephone System now includes 150 instruments.

— George Fraser, ex-mayor of Halifax, fell down stairs, in his house at Truro, a few nights ago, and died from the effects.

— The C. P. R. and Western Union Telegraph companies have secured quarters for this session in the parliament buildings at Fredericton.

— The government has decided to reimpose the same canal tolls on the St. Lawrence as last season, two cents per ton on wheat bound to Montreal or ports east.

— Several Calabogie farmers who purchased land in Darling township have capitalists looking over it for ore, and so good are the prospects that \$50,000 has been offered for a site.

— On Tuesday last, Mrs. Watters, of St. John, was burned to death while putting fuel on the fire. She was alone in the house at the time, and the fire was well proceeding before she was discovered.

— On Friday New Brunswick eggs were quoted in Boston at 12c. to 13c. per dozen, and New Brunswick potatoes at \$1.50 a barrel, with P. E. Island rose potatoes at 50c. to 52c. per bbl., and P. E. Island hebron potatoes at 45c. to 50c. per bbl.

— Parties digging muck at Rolling Dam recently discovered a layer of marl about six inches thick four feet from the surface. Under the marl are indications of coal and other mineral deposits. If this pans out what is claimed for it, there will no doubt soon be a boom in muck at Rolling Dam.

— The certificate of Capt. Robert Nutter, of the St. John barkentine Minnie G. Elkin, has been suspended six months for violating the merchant shipping act by leaving one of his crew in a hospital at Philadelphia without depositing the said sailor's wages and effects, and proceeding to sea without the ship's register and articles.

— The number of post offices in Canada is eight times as great in proportion to the population as the number in the United States. Of the 7,761 post offices in the Dominion, 2,927 are in Ontario, 1,382 in Quebec, 1,372 in Nova Scotia, 1,070 in New Brunswick, 304 in Prince Edward Island, 129 in British Columbia, 329 in Manitoba, and 145 in the Northwest Territories.

— The Salmon River, N. S., mine was discovered in 1880, and the first crushing at an outside mill made in March, 1881. The mill on the property was completed, and in August, 1881, and from that date until November, 1888, the mine has produced 64,500 tons of quartz which yielded through the mill over 31,000 ozs. of gold, on an average of about 9 1/2 dwts. per ton of ore crushed. It has yielded to its owners in round figures \$600,000, and after paying all expenses of equipment, working, protracted litigation, etc., has paid in cash dividends close upon \$300,000, or had paid that amount up to the end of November, 1888. The company owns quite a village of buildings.

— Lady Dufferin has written a pamphlet on India which has attracted much attention in England.

— The Earl of Hopetown has been appointed Lord High Commissioner of the general assembly of the Church of Scotland.

— Lord Salisbury has selected Sir Julian Pauncefote for the post of British Minister at Washington, on account of the latter's knowledge of the fishery question.

— An Englishman, supposed to be Richard Piggot, was arrested at the Hotel Des Ambassadeurs, Madrid, on the 25th February, under the name of Ronald Ponsonby. He afterward committed suicide with a revolver.

— The Deputies and Brieux, and Steenackers, have declined to sign the radical anti Boulanger declaration, started to test the strength of Boulanger's claims as to the numbers of his adherents. Several Deputies have signed including Lockroy.

— The Pall Mall Gazette says: "A very singular accident happened this week to M. Ziem, the famous painter of Eastern subjects. The artist was in his studio alone, and handling some old armor, tried on a casque which was part of the set. The visor fell, and the painter found his head completely shut in. He did all he could to free himself, and ultimately had to walk out in this singular costume and obtain from a locksmith his order of release."

— Li Yen Pang, a Chinese nobleman, said to be worth \$95,000,000, is in New York.

— W. J. Arkell of the Judge has bought Frank Leslie's Illustrated newspaper for \$400,000.

— The Pennsylvania railroad system claims to have lost but three pieces of baggage out of 5,000,000 pieces handled last year.

— Kelley & Lyle's mill at Leavenworth, the largest concern of the kind in Kansas, with an elevator containing 200,000 bushels of wheat, was burned Monday morning. The loss will be over \$300,000. Spontaneous combustion was probably the cause.

— A terrible explosion took place in a aquifactory at Plymouth, Pa., at noon on the 25th, by which nine girls were burned to death and 17 severely injured. The factory was owned by J. R. Powell, who employed many women and boys. Geo. F. Hesse was blown through the window of the building and fatally injured.

— A spectacle peculiar to western Pennsylvania and similar to one given up by President and Mrs. Cleveland, when they passed through Pittsburg, Pa., two years ago, is being prepared for President-elect Harrison and party. It has been arranged to have the train halted for a few moments at Jeannette, near Pittsburg, and have all the gas wells lighted in the entire neighborhood.
