Canadian millers have advanced the price of flour twenty cents per barrel in sympathy with the increase in the price of wheat.

The winter fair opened Tuesday at Guelph, Ont., with the best display of live stock and poultry ever seen in Canada.

A terrific explosion of molten metal occurred at the Sharon, Pa., steel works Tuesday. Eleven men were badly in-jured and three will probably die.

The minister of Agriculture at O tawa has decided to prosecute parties in Quebec who declined to give information called for by the census schedules.

The temporary log house of the men brushing dykes at lower Turo was fired by incendiaries Wednesday. The build-was was at the base of Savage's Island. The fire committee of Sydney has de-

cided to send Chief Menzie to Haliax and larger towns to look into the equip-ment and fire fighting facilities.

The Dominion government has ap-pointed two men to examine into the correctness of the census as taken by the Dominion enumerators in Toronto

Henry Palmer, aged 13, and David Murray, 12, were arrested at Amherst Wednesday, charged with setting fire to a barn on the marsh belonging to Richard Beatty.

The Department of Agriculture has prepared a memorandum showing that there were shipped from Canada to South Africa to December 9 for the im-perial War office : Hay, 107,744 tons ; flour, 1,914 tons ; oats, 2,090 tons ; beef, 40,776 cases ; jams, 11,743 cases.
