FREDERICTON HAS ENVIABLE FIRE RECORD

Fredericton, Aug. 8.—Fredericton has a remarkable record of not having a fire of any consequence for upwards of a year, in fact, since August 4, 1908, when a barn belonging to Edward Hurley was destroyed, there has not been a fire doing more than \$10 or \$15 damage, and the fire department has been required to wet hose on only one or two occasions and only for blazes of an incipient nature.

TURKEY AND GREECE MAY NOT FIGHT

London, Aug. 8.—The acute stage reached in the dispute between Turkey and Greece over Crete is causing anxiety in the European capitals, especially as always accompanies any diplomatic difficulty in that quarter of Europe, but as M. Iswolsky, the Russian minister for foreign affairs, said in an interview at Cowes last Tuesday, if there is an awkward development in the situation, Europe will see that no mischievous effects result therefrom; there is no idea that hostilities will break out and every belief is that satisfactory settlement will be reached.

CATHOLIC SOCIETIES IN CONVENTION

Pittsburg, Pa., August 8.—The convention of the American Federation of Catholic Societies was formally opened here today with solemn pontifical mass at St. Paul's Cathedral, Bishop Canavin, of Pittsburg, was the celebrant. At a mass meeting tonight, Bishop Canavin addressed a large audience, urging suppression of the slave traffic. The delegates and visitors to all the meetings of the convention are manifesting great interest in Chief Red Willow and Chief White Horse, two full-blooded Sioux Indians, from Dakota, who are delegates from the Pine Ridge Mission of Jesuit Missionaries.

She remembers the Miramichi fire very vividly and related to Mrs. Dunnett some little incidents of the day. No doubt very few people are aware we have such an interesting old lady living in our county.

Rome, Aug. 9.—It is stated that the Government, through its Ambassador at London, will shortly enter into negotiations having as their object the conclusion of a commercial treaty with Canada.

Foster Willard, a young New Yorker, and a novice at flying, made five successful flights in the aeroplane Golden Flyer, of the New York Aero Club, over Hempstead Plain, near Mineola, L. I., at dawn today. The lengths of the flight varied from seven-tenths of a mile to two miles. A crowd of two hundred persons, made of whom came in automobile, witnessed his flight this morning. W. K. Vanderbilt, Jr., was among the spectators, following the aeroplane in his motor car.

A large congregation assembled yesterday afternoon in the cathedral when the interesting ceremony of the blessing of bells took place. Harvesters! Harvesters! Again the West calls to the East for helpers to assist in harvesting the greatest crop Western Canada has ever produced.

The increased acreage under cultivation and the splendid weather conditions that have prevailed throughout the entire season have combined to produce a wheat crop estimated at from 125,000,000 to 150,000,000 bushels, and to successfully harvest this enormous crop will require at least 30,000 farm laborers.

The West can supply but a small fraction of this number, and consequently the Western farmers are obliged to look to the East for assistance in order to save the crops, which of course require to be harvested within a certain period of time.

CZAR DELAYED BY FOG.

Kiel, Aug. 7.—Emperor Nicholas, of Russia, who is returning from Cowes on board the Imperial yacht Standart did not reach Kiel until nearly ten o'clock tonight, the passage of the Russian fleet through the channel having been delayed by fog. Emperor William was aboard the Standart near Rendsburg at six o'clock and met a hearty reception from the emperor and the royal family. The journey to Kiel was immediately resumed. Emperor William remaining aboard the Standart and for the greater part of the time in private conversation with Emperor Nicholas.
