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POLICE COURT
In the police court yesterday S. K.
Cohen appeared in answer to the

separate sanitary conveniences for
the female employees.
After Inspector Kenney gave evi-

plumber to make repairs. His next
complaint that he kept at his resi-

night. James Kennedy, a neighbor,
gave evidence, saying that the cow
bawls incessantly except for brief in-
tervals when it is appeased by having
something to eat. He also made
allegations regarding Cohen's habits
of Sabbath observance and amid
laughter told of seeing Cohen's dog
in the yard the day he had sworn that
it had been sent to the country.
The Magistrate commented on the
sanitary aspect of the situation, on
the possible hunger or disease of the
animal and on the sale of milk from
it. He instructed Cohen to secure a
veterinary's report on the animal.
Both cases were adjourned until Wed-
nesday.

BALFOUR, IN PROPOSING CENSURE, DISPLAYS OLD TIME SAGACITY

THE RIGHT HON. ARTHUR JAMES BALFOUR
Mr. A. J. Balfour, leader of the opposition in the House of Commons, again displayed that political sagacity which for so many years has given him undisputed leadership of his party when he announced in the lower chamber that he proposed to move a vote of censure of the government for having obtained from King George the promise of sufficient peers to pass the Veto bill.

NORTHUMBERLAND IS READY TO FIGHT
Outlook There is Most Encouraging for the Liberal-Conservative Forces—Hon. Donald Morrison Gaining Daily.

WESTMORLAND CO. IS KEEN FOR FRAY
Most Encouraging Evidence of Desire of Electors to Smash Reciprocity in No Uncertain Way.

Liberal Forces Weaker.
It is inconceivable the extent of the deterioration of the government forces in Northumberland since the last ap-
pointment here in the sentiment of the electorate. The fight in North-
umberland has already commenced, and with systematic organization the Liberal-Conservative forces enter the campaign with an optimistic outlook for the return of their candidate, Hon. Donald Morrison.
The party is a unit in supporting Mr. Morrison, and if there is any man in Northumberland who can retrieve the election, the eloquent speaker is unquestionably the man to carry the party to victory.

Mr. Sifton May Come.
An announcement of meetings may be expected shortly. Hon. Mr. Morrison informed your correspondent that Hon. Clifford Sifton might in-
clude Northumberland in his itiner-
ary. At all events the ex-minister will be invited to come and address a Miramichi audience at Chatham on the 10th inst. A meeting for Newcastle is likely to be held this week, when Mr. Morrison and others will take part.
There is no mining the report of the fact that Mr. Sifton is vigorously opposed to the ratification of the reciprocity pact. Again there is dissatis-
faction in the party in Newcastle. There appears to be no head to the Liberal interests here and inferentially the once staunch supporters of the party have awakened to a more vivid

Among recent visitors to arrive in Moncton from the States was Stanley Wilbur, son of John Wilbur, former one of the strongest Liberals in this part of the country; one of the old-
time and all time Liberals. This young man has been in different parts of the States, east and west, and he says that in his opinion the Hon. Champ Clark voiced the feelings of the people of the United States when he said reciprocity was the first step in the direction of annexation, and hope, as he does, to see the day when the Stars and Stripes will fly over this country. Mr. Wilbur ridiculed the idea that the New Brun-
swick farmer would be able to sell his produce in the Boston market, and get the high prices that are charged consumers there. He says everything is controlled by trusts and combines, and the dealers are obliged to have large profits because of the high rents etc. He says further that the farm-
ers of New Brunswick get better prices on the whole for what they have to sell than the farmers of New Hampshire and Vermont, who are nearer the Boston market than we are. Mr. Wilbur says it is all a trick to get control of Canada, and use this market for the extension of their manufacturing industries. He advised all his Liberal friends to have nothing to do with the Taft-Fielding trade agreement, and says he has seen scores of abandoned farms in Ver-
mont and New Hampshire, where agricultural conditions generally are far worse than in New Brunswick.

Appointment For Dr. Warwick.
Dr. William Warwick has been nam-
ed, and has accepted, the appointment of bacteriologist in connection with the quarantine station at Partridge Island, and will take up his duties im-
mediately. He is a member of the staff of the Home for Incurables, and as pathologist at the General Public Hospital.
