

ALL SINGLE MEN TO BE CALLED OUT THIS WEEK?

SINGLE MEN TO BE SUMMONED THIS WEEK BY ROYAL PROCLAMATION TO ATTEST

London, Feb. 12.—The Central News is authority for a report that all single men are to be called on to enlist next week. A royal proclamation shortly will be issued notifying all single men to attend the Central News states, and attributes the unexpected speedy summons to the many recent consultations between the minister of munitions and war office.

CONDEMNNS SUGGESTION OF REPRISALS AT FREDERICTON

Lord High Chancellor of England declares this war of ideals, and not merely of men.

London, Feb. 13.—The Lord High Chancellor, Baron Buckmaster, speaking last night at Kilsby, strongly condemned the suggested reprisals for Zeppelin raids. He said: "There could be no greater tragedy in the black tragedy of this time than when we had conquered Germany, we should have mangled ourselves and our behavior upon the very model we set out to break. This is not merely a war of arms, but of ideals."

CAPTAIN DISAPPEARS AFTER UNLOADING HIS VESSEL, NO TRACE OF HIM

Special to The Standard. St. Stephen, Feb. 13.—A case of disappearance is reported from Calais. The schooner James Young, Captain Oscar M. Snowman, owned by the Gardner Lumber Company, of Gardiner, Maine, arrived at Calais on Jan. 25th with a cargo of coal for the steamer S. S. Corporation. The coal was discharged and the freight paid to Capt. Snowman. The schooner is now at a wharf loading lumber with the cook in charge and Marshall Crossman of Calais has received a telegram from the Gardner Lumber Company asking him to try and find Capt. Snowman, who has disappeared. A man answering his description bought a ticket for the west at the Maine Central depot in Calais on Feb. 4th.

VON PAPAN'S CHECKS, SEIZED BY ENGLISH, PROVE GERMAN ACTIVITIES

MORE VON PAPAN CHECKS

In view of the fact that the Department of Justice by subpoena has required officers of the Kings National Bank of Washington, to produce for the use of the government all records of the financial transactions conducted through that bank by Captain Franz von Papan, the recalled and discredited German Military Attaché, reproductions of checks as presented herewith are of exceptional interest. Photographs of the checks are now in the hands of Frank L. Polk, counselor to the State Department, having been handed to the American Ambassador by the British authorities, who, after granting a safe conduct to Captain von Papan, discovered when they searched him at Falmouth that he had agreed to act as a sort of mail carrier for persons engaged in pro-German activities in the United States. Herewith is reproduced some of the checks and check stubs taken from Captain von Papan by the British. Comparison of two of the exhibits, as indicated in the above reproductions, shows the German Embassy deposited \$2,000 to Von Papan's account in the Kings National Bank three days before the discredited attaché left for Bremer Horn. Count von Bernstorff paid to Von Papan \$2,000 three days after Von Papan sent a check to the German Consul at Seattle for \$2,000, a check for \$1,000 supposed to have been for Paul Keenig and another to him for "secret" amounting to \$500, are also shown.

BROTHER OF FRENCHMAN A SUICIDE

Paris, Feb. 13.—The body of Francis Pegoud, brother of Adolphe Pegoud, the aviator, who was killed in action nearly six months ago, was found by a passer-by yesterday hanging from a tree in the vicinity of Versailles.
