In addition to these missionaries are sent to Corea from Australia.

An interesting fact mentioned regarding the medical branch of the mission work that 1400 patients were treated at the dispensary in one year, and through the medical missionaries many converts are made.

Miss Robb had for exhibition several pictures, one of a class of High School graduates were fine looking girls who would be a credit to any school in any land.

At the close of the address, which was greatly enjoyed by all present, a collection was taken up for missions.

WE MUST KEEP WATCH AGAINST DISLOYALTY

War Election Act and Women at the Peace Conference Discussed—Are There Such Members Among St. John Societies?—(Cordelia in The Toronto Telegram).

Dr. Margaret Gordon, one of the first members of the Women's Liberal Association, at their meeting, moved a resolution of two women on the peace commission, basing her recommendation on a resolution of like nature formed by Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt and forwarded to President Wilson. Dr. Gordon also moved that the Premier be asked to repeal the Canada War Act, by which only women who have husbands or some overseas may use the vote.

Does not the fact that Dr. Gordon could bring in such a resolution to Canadian women without being strongly denounced prove that Canada is not safe yet without the War Election Act? Are not women whose hearts and minds have been nearest to the struggle the safest to decide Canada's fate now?

During our four years and more of war the Local Council of Women in Toronto has been called upon five times to make important decisions. Each time Dr. Gordon has been the mouthpiece of the pacifist sympathizers who opposed the most vigorous conduct of the war. Before the war Dr. Gordon was a peace and arbitration leader. Just this week Dr. Gordon remained seated when a standing vote was taken at the Local Council that Toronto women were strenuously opposed to any association with enemy women!

It was Dr. Gordon who, when black-robed mothers at the Local Council pleaded that the comrades of their dead sons be given more reinforcements, wailed: "It seems to me that you mothers who have lost your sons would be satisfied until other mothers' sons are killed!"

Dr. Gordon's remarks on this occasion were greeted with hisses! It was such a demonstration appears to have greeted her echo of Mrs. Catt's desire when brought before the Women's Liberal Association. They appointed a special committee to deal with it as they might.

How much longer will Canadian women act as a "yes-yess" chorus to U. S. pacifists? Weakened women and so-called women leaders across the line were the first victims of pro-German and pacifist propaganda. They helped to keep the United States out of the war, and they had had their way the war would have been over while Germany was on top and her victims not yet prepared to stand up for themselves. Men blush and apologize for these menaces to their country. For they know that the reason the best Americans have had the best in the presence of the allies' sacrifices is that these women helped to keep them from doing their duty for their first.

Why should Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt now become a leader of Canadian women? Who is the lady Dr. Gordon so blithely championed? Here is what the New York World has to say: "Voicing a violent protest against the appointment of a woman on the Peace Commission, the Women Voters' Anti-Suffrage Party has addressed a letter to President Wilson primarily attacking Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt as a pacifist and calling upon Mr. Wilson to 'safeguard the peace table' from her and her supporters. The letter says: "Referring to women's demand for representation on the Peace Commission, we beg to protest against such appointments. In general we contend that men, having fought and conducted the war, should control the peace terms. "May we remind you that the suffrage issue who sponsors this demand, although now a member of the Women's Committee of the Council of National Defense, was as late as March, 1917, honorary vice-chairman of the Women's Peace Party, which hampered preparedness? She presided as chairman at the organization meeting of the New York branch of that party (Feb. 4, 1915), and from the chair couple protests against the atrocities of the Greek and Bulgarian armies with attacks on all armies, including our own. "The Antis cite the former association in suffrage work of Mrs. Catt
