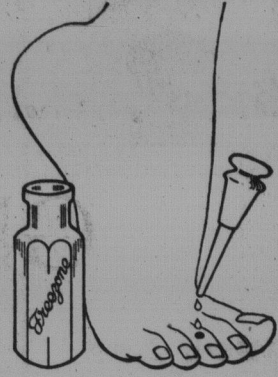

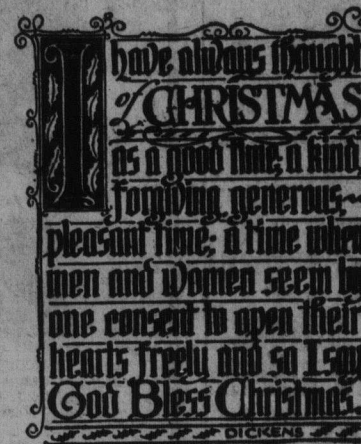
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Sporting Dope Entirely Wrong

Secretary of Dominion Football Assn. States No Money Deposited for Scottish Players.

Montreal, Dec. 9.—Characterizing as "jottings" the statement recently appearing in a Montreal newspaper that \$10,000 had been deposited with a Glasgow bank for payment to the Scottish international soccer players before they embarked for their tour of Canada last summer, David W. Roy, secretary of the Dominion Football Association, writing to the soccer editor of the Montreal Herald, says that so far from such being the case, the facts were that the association had no money for that or any other purpose, and were actually in debt prior to the tour.

Mr. Roy adds he hopes to have the full statement of the Scottish tour ready at an early date.
