P. E. I. SENATOR COMPLAINS OF FREIGHT RATE

Enormous Loss for Potato Growers by Present System of Tolls.

L. C. R. AND P. E. I. RY. FOR RAIL COMMISSION

Order in Council Will be Adopted by Cabinet to Define Rail Status.

Ottawa, May 18.—In the Senate today Senator Prowse again drew the attention of the government to the difficulty in marketing the surplus potato crop in Prince Edward Island. The government, he said, had put the onus of railway rates on the railway commission, while the chairman of the commission claimed that control of rates on the intercolonial and P.E.I. Railway remained with the government. Delay in furnishing relief from exorbitant freight rates was losing thousands of dollars to the producers and shippers of potatoes in P.E.I. and increasing the cost to the consumer in other parts of Canada.

Sir John Loughheed said that the policy of the government had been to give control of all freight rates to the railway commission. An order-in-council would be adopted shortly definitely placing the intercolonial and P.E.I. Railway under the railway commission, as the railway commission evidently did not consider that they had authority at present to deal with freight rates on these roads. He would again call the attention of the minister of railways to the problem of the P.E.I. potato growers.

Boys Break Jail At Charlottetown

Charlottetown, P. E. I., May 18.—Two boys, Joseph H. Dobson and Herbert Ingram, aged about sixteen or seventeen years, who had been serving terms in Queens County Jail, awaiting trial for the murder of a man by shooting, made their escape yesterday. Both boys were bare-footed and one was coatless at the time of their getaway.

Getting out of their cells by removing a bar and smashing the lock and portion of the outer door by means of the heavy bar which they pryed from the window, the jailer being absent at the time.

Some Operators Will Commence Sawing Soon—Filed up With Lumber.

Newcastle, May 18.—A meeting of the mill-owners of the Miramichi was held here on Tuesday afternoon. The following were present—R. A. Snowball, Boyd Eaton, Wm. Sullivan, J. O'Brien, J. W. Maloney, Dr. Fraser, J. W. Brankley, Mac O'Brien, A. J. Ritchie, W. G. Thurber, Wm. Sinclair, J. P. Burchill, David Ritchie and R. Gill. Matters of a routine nature were discussed, and most of the operators present claimed they were doing minor mill repairs and were all working a 10 hour day. Some of the operators announced that they intended to commence sawing as soon as their mills were ready, and did not anticipate any trouble in getting crews.

Up to the present there has been no word of any lumber being shipped to the Old Country, and prospects at present do not appear to be very bright. As a result, most of the mills are so badly piled up with lumber, it is a question if they will operate this season.

Ex-Kaiser's Son Is Found Guilty

Convicted of Illegally Exporting Capital Out of Germany Into Holland.

Berlin, May 18.—Erich Friedlander, second son of former Emperor William, was today found guilty of illegally exporting capital to Holland through the firm of Philippssohn, Grusser & Co.

Hermann Mueller, former German chancellor, in November, 1920, asserted in the Reichstag that 100 eminent persons, among the Eitel Friedrich, and other members of the former royal family, had smuggled into Holland money aggregating 250,000,000 marks. He demanded that those involved in the smuggling should be severely punished.

House May Sit On Victoria Day

Bill to Extend Time for Oleo to be Introduced Soon.

Ottawa, May 18.—Replying to a question by the Hon. W. S. Fielding, the Prime Minister announced in the House this afternoon that the resolution providing for an extension of the time for the manufacture and importation of oleomargarine would be taken up by the government.

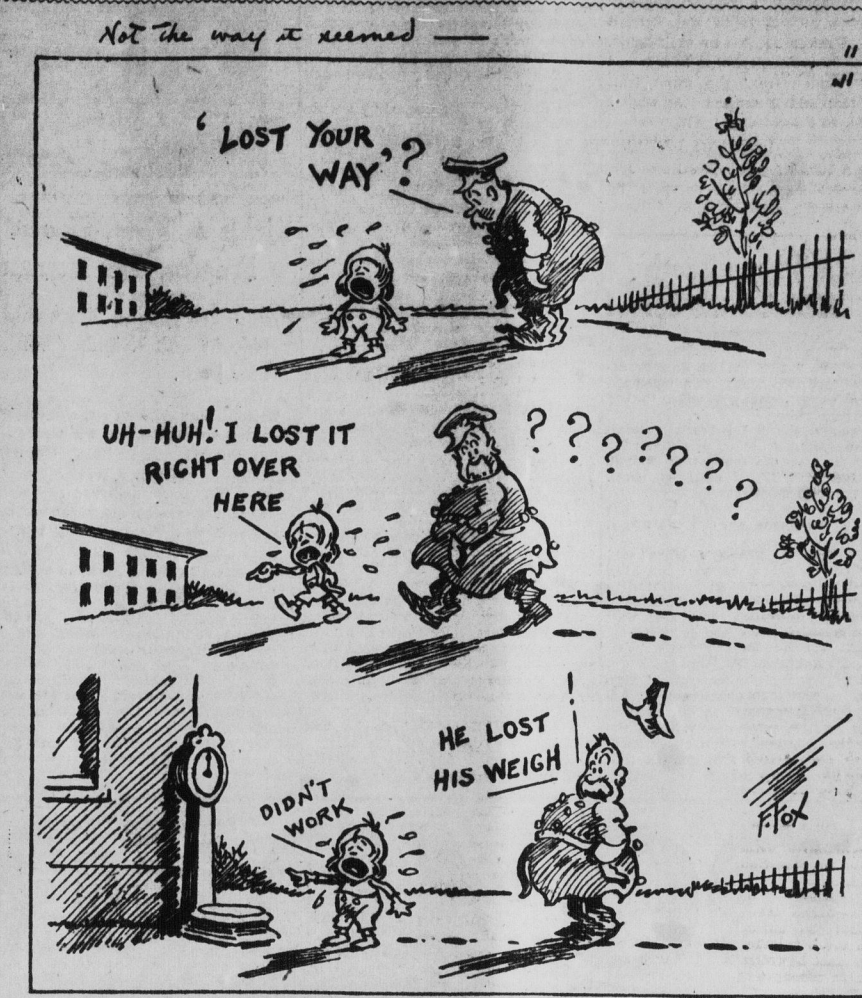

The government would hear the opinion of members and would make an announcement in the matter later.

No Money To Pay The "Dry" Agents

Washington, May 18.—About 700 prohibition enforcement agents in various parts of the United States have been temporarily laid off for lack of funds to pay their salaries. It was announced today at prohibition enforcement headquarters here.

The men were given a forty-day vacation without pay, but it was said, will be reinstated on July 1, when the appropriations for the next fiscal year become available.

Asserts Marriages In Japan Too Lax

Kobe College President Lifts Lid on Moral Conditions in That Country.

Kansas City, May 18.—While politically Japan ranks on a par with the other great nations of the world, morally and spiritually she ranks very low according to Miss Charlotte DeForest, president of Kobe College.

Miss DeForest said modern civilization in Japan is being retarded because of ancient prejudice against and modern exploitation of her woman.

"Late statistics show one out of every six marriages in Japan lead to divorce," said Miss DeForest. "This is because of parent domination and the lack of proper ceremony. Many persons enter marriage without any ceremony. All that is necessary is to register their marriage with the proper Government officials."

"Many persons enter into a trial marriage, and after living together for a considerable time, become dissatisfied and sever relations. If they have not registered, no legal step is required to annul the marriage."

One of the aims of the Christian population in Japan is to eliminate this condition. And there is a movement now under way in that country to require more stringent marriage laws, according to Miss DeForest.

Since the advent of the military party in control of Japan thousands of factories have sprung up over all the country. Women have been drafted to work in these factories.

"The women laborers live in camps with the men and the moral conditions are deplorable," she said. "This leads to one of two things. They are either sent home to die of tuberculosis or of other disease."

This treatment of women will eventually lead to a revolution in Japan, Miss DeForest predicted.

Miss DeForest has spent the major portion of her life in teaching Japanese women. She is the representative of the First Congregational Church.

Canada May Get Some German Gold

Ottawa, May 18.—A small proportion of the first German payment on reparations may come to Canada. The payment of 150,000,000 gold marks made will, it is stated here, be applied to the cost of the Allied army of occupation.

As Canada contributed a small number of men to the army of occupation for a short time immediately after the armistice, she may be the recipient of an amount partially to cover her expenditure.

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DEFER WAGE CONSIDERATION

Sydney, N. S., May 18.—Decision as to acceptance or rejection of the proposed ten per cent. wage cut suggested by the Dominion Steel Corporation as a means of obtaining rail contracts, was deferred by the metal workers' council of Sydney at a meeting held tonight to consider the matter. The steel workers decided to postpone decision, pending further negotiations with the company.

Daylight Saving In Fredericton

Mayor Issues Proclamation Ordering New Time Into Effect Next Sunday.

Fredericton, N. B., May 18.—Daylight saving time will go into effect officially in Fredericton on Sunday, May 22nd, a proclamation to that effect having been signed today by Mayor Reid. The proclamation says that in pursuance of a resolution passed by the city council on April 24th, the citizens, public services and institutions are requested to set forward all clocks one hour at midnight Saturday, May 21st.

Mayor Reid said that the city of Fredericton and all departments of the city corporation, including the construction works on the streets, would be operating on the new time commencing with next week and that he expected the citizens generally would adopt the new time.

The provincial government offices here will be operated on the daylight saving time.

So far the suburban towns of Devon and Maryville have made no move towards adopting daylight saving time. In fact it was said this morning that neither town would change their time regardless of what Fredericton might do.

Anglicans Want \$1,500 Salary Lowest

Halifax, N. S., May 18.—That the minimum salary paid to any priest of the Church of England in Nova Scotia should be \$1,500 per annum, was recommended by the Nova Scotian Synod of the Church of England in session here today. A clause originally contained in the recommendation, which would have made five years' service in the church a necessary qualification for a priest who should come under this ruling, was struck out, when the matter came before the Synod as a whole.

Missing Deer Isle Captain In Hospital

Boston, May 18.—Capt. John S. Lowe of Deer Isle, Me., who was reported missing to the police after he had disappeared from the schooner Odell and from the home of his nephew L. L. Perry, 19 Cottage street, Everett, was found to be a patient at the City Hospital yesterday, receiving treatment from an old injury. For three weeks he had been bunking on the Odell, tied up at the Turner & Gilbert wharf, East Boston. Watchman Charles Sanford last saw him at the wharf a week ago Sunday. The next day, appearing at the office of O. A. Gilbert, 75 State street, he complained of feeling ill.

Saturday his nephew visited the schooner and falling to find him, notified the police. Mrs. Lowe reported that her husband was not at Deer Isle, nor had his daughter, who also lives in Everett, seen him. Last night the police notified these relatives that Capt. Lowe had been found.

SECOND GUILTY OF MURDER.

Toronto, May 18.—William McFadden was this afternoon found guilty of murder of Cecil Sabina, druggist, during a robbery of his store on March 5. The jury returned this verdict after a short deliberation. Two men now await sentence for this crime—Roy Horum and McFadden.

Each of these men denied their guilt on the murder charge, although admitting complicity in the robbery.

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NEW GYMNASIUM WILL BE BUILT BY MT. ALLISON

One Hundred Thousand Dollars to be Added to the Endowment Fund.

BOARD OF REGENTS IN ANNUAL SESSION

Hon. J. Wood Resigns His Position as Treasurer of the Institution.

Sackville, May 18.—The regents of Mount Allison have held three sessions today, much business being transacted. Reports from three heads of institutions, Dr. Borden, Dr. Wigle and Dr. Palmer, were submitted, as also were reports relating to result of forward campaign for funds conducted in February last. On motion it was decided to allocate \$100,000 of the sum subscribed to endowment purposes, and to begin immediately the erection of a gymnasium to replace the old Lingley Hall, which was burned down last January.
