THE RECENT METHODIST CONFERENCE

The Editor of The Telegraph: Sir—In 1855 the Methodists of the Maritime Provinces were united and the conference of eastern British America was organized. This was done in Halifax under the presidency of the Rev. John Becham, D. D., of the mother church in the old land. At that time there were in all the territory seventy circuits and membership of 13,721 and 69 ministers, now there is in this conference alone 98 circuits, about 15,000 members and a ministerial staff of over 120. During the intervening years the denominational name has been changed from the Methodist Church in Canada, and then to the Methodist church—changes occasioned by the uniting of the several sections of the Methodist family in Canada. The conference which has just completed its work is the eleventh which has met in St. John, of which the following were the distinguished members: 1856—Mathew Richey, D. D., president; William Temple, secretary.
