C. J. Milligan Writes of Terrible Experience of People of Regina--Some Sad Cases--He Was Lucky.

The first news, outside of the press despatches, to reach the city concerning the disaster in Regina on June 30, was received here yesterday in a letter from C. J. Milligan, a former resident of St. John but now in charge of the lands titles office, Regina, to his niece, Miss Margaret Milligan.

Speaking of the destruction wrought by the cyclone he says: "My garage was lifted several feet with the car in it, but there was a lumber pile up the side of it nearly as high as the garage, and the fence kept the garage from coming any further, and while it is all twisted out of shape, the car's practicably as good as new. The engine, boiler, fly, being some of the lamps broken by flying debris. My good luck followed me even to the boat club, for while most of the boats were blown away, mine was not. The canoe blown almost for miles (one of them came through the fourth story window of a big business block and another one is sitting in each minute of the middle of the town. Boat and canoe are entirely unharmed. You perhaps can't appreciate how lucky this all is without seeing the Lorne street district of Regina as it is today."

"When I tell you that the Land Titles building had the roof taken clear off it and some of the windows with the brickwork blown right and all of the big churches, Presbyterian, Methodist and Baptist, all of which are on Lorne street, completely wrecked, and all of the houses in the vicinity of the city, valued at \$80,000, you can form some little idea of the force of the storm."

"I have a splendid conception now of the force of the world, for if I can gauge it all by what I saw yesterday, I think we saw here for a few moments on Sunday with houses flying through the air and a noise that was indescribable. So far they have done very much like that here, a few still missing and some badly injured. My house proved a haven of refuge for the injured in the block opposite to me. I was in the house when the storm I guess I had 50 or 60 people in the house and almost every bed occupied with someone badly injured. In the house directly opposite to me, a woman was killed and her father badly injured. In the next house to him the father had both shoulders dislocated and all that saved the lives of the family was that the piano fell on one side wall long enough for them to get out. In the house next to that on the opposite side the whole family would have been killed but for the fact that they ran to the shed and the house blew away while they were out of it. They had no sooner left the shed than the shed blew away."

whether such pastor be a member or not, provided such complaint in the latter case is made in writing by such church or at least a member in good standing of such church as aforesaid; and shall determine whether such complaints should be submitted to the said conference, subject to the conference, and shall perform any other duties usually falling to executive officers. Other committees may be appointed or elected from time to time as occasion may arise.

Article 6—The annual meeting shall be held in connection with the annual meeting of the association of United Baptists of New Brunswick, at such intervals as the executive may direct, and any special meeting may be called by the executive. Article 7—This constitution shall not be altered, added to, or amended except by vote of two-thirds of the members present at an annual meeting, after due notice having been given at the last preceding annual session, or by unanimous vote of the conference at any annual meeting without previous notice.

Article 8—The proceedings of the conference during its sessions shall be governed by parliamentary usage, so-called. Article 9—This constitution shall continue to be a merely voluntary organization until such time as the association shall have adopted legislation bringing all members to a certain extent under control, as to discipline of the association. It was laid on the table.

Article 10—The constitution shall be amended by the following: Section 1, section 4 and 5 were adopted.
