"Newy" Lalonde was again prominent, while Pitre played better than is usual for him on local ice. He made many spectacular dashes, but was unable to outguess the local defense.

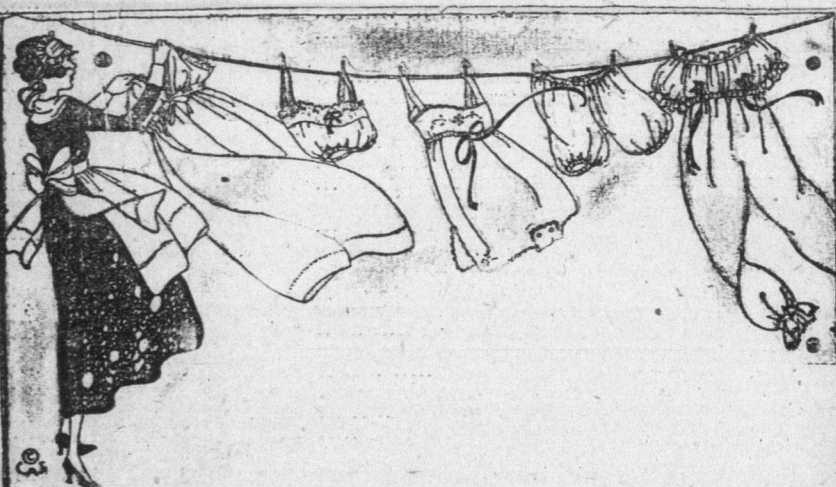
