I can take it up with the authorities here, and then when Mr. Lemieux is in Berlin we could all see him together in reference to it. A few people might be brought into line in this connection.

In Mr.Lemicux's speech at Niagara tomorrow you will learn of a further advance which the Post Office Department is contemplating. Mr.Lemicux has promised to give us a first consideration, and his willingness to do so will, I think, assist in the rural districts. What is desirable in this connection might well be a subject also for consideration at the time of the convention.

Again let me say that I feel the sooner you can bring on the convention the better. My idea is that it would be well for you to send a telegram to me at the Department of Labour which would be helpful not only in the county but through the province, and I will reply promptly so that my answer can be read to the meeting. I will resign immediately and endeavour to get away at once.

This is a long letter, but I hope you will not think its suggestions presumptuous. I am only thinking of matters as they appeal to me from here, and of course without having had any opportunity of conferring with yourself or other members of the executive. Let us feel that the battle is now on, and get into harness at once.
