that you can do to assist us would be greatly appreciated, because he is the sole surviving child now, and he is left to look after his mother and to assist, also, in looking after the affairs of his father's estate.

The boy, of course, can make no representations himself. He is not afraid to go back. He knows his duty, and I do feel that since this family have lost their oldest boy, and the father in the service of our King and Country they have made a pretty substantial contribution to the country and to the cause.

I am enclosing you a copy of a letter which I have sent to C.G. Power, the present Air Minister, and I would appreciate any services which you can render in order to assist this boy. I can recommend him in every respect, and I know that he can be of some advantage and some use to the young airmen who are taking their courses in this country. He went over as Pilot Officer, was promoted to Flight-Lieutenant, and had he remained in England I know and am confident that he would have received additional appointments.

I may say that Rt. Honorable R.B. Bennett assisted us materially in getting this boy home. In fact, he took him to his own home and looked after him for three or four days, because when he returned from the route in Belgium and France he was absolutely exhausted. I received a letter from Mr. Bennett yesterday and he spoke in glowing terms of this boy, and of the services which he had rendered to his King and Country, and the high esteem inwhich he has held by the R.A.F. in England. If this letter would be any good to you I would be glad to send you the original or a copy.
