

side of her mother, from an Indian reported to belong to the Cheyenne tribe or band. If that is the case she was by the 2^d clause of the 2^d section of the Act 14318 U.S. Stat. ch. 59 an Indian entitled to share in the property of the band and by the same act her descendants were also entitled to share.

Charles S. Garrison, the eldest son of Charles S. Garrison, by his wife Opal, before referred to, appears to have been born in 1832 and to have resided continuously at Camp Navajo from that time to the present.

The provisions of the Act 14318 U.S. Stat. ch. 59, sec. 2, remained in force until amendment until the year 1869, at which time Charles S. Garrison would have been 37 years of age.
