SIGN OF COMING EVENT

All Foreign Agents Must Leave Vladivostock.

Order Looked Upon As a Precursor That the Russian Fortress Is Expected to Become the Seat of War Very Soon-Firing Heard Near Paracels Island on Wednesday - Was Kamamura Busy?

Washington, May 13.—Richard S. Greener, American commercial agent at Vladivostock, has cabled the American State Department that all the for-

Ican State Department that all the foreign commercial agents there have been asked to leave Vladivostock fortress, and are given permission to reside in the cities of the maritime provinces. Mr. Greener himself was just leaving Vladivostock for Haborogsk.

It is recalled here that a similar measure was adopted by the Russian authorities at Port Arthur at the beginning of the investment of that place by the Japanese land and sea forces, and hence it is assumed that Vladivostock is expected to become a centre of the seat of war very soon.

Heard Firing Wednesday.

Hue, Upper Cochin China, May 19.—
A small steamer that arrived yesterday morning shortly after midnight, reports

It was unable to determine the nationality of the ships, out it is believed the vessels belonged to Kamamura's flying squadron, and to Kamamura's flying squadron, and that they were moving against the Russian fleet. It is thought Admiral Rojestvensky's movements have betrayed to the Japanese an intent to advance on Formosa Straits by the inner Paracels passage, and that Vice-Admiral Togo is massing his strength to command the waters between these labeled. mand the waters between those islands and Hainan. TO PHOTOGRAPH JAP WORKS.

Russians Expect Much From a Pano ramic Camera and a Kite.

St. Petersburg, May 19.—A recently invented apparatus for photographing panoramas of wide stretches of country by means of a camera suspended from a kite has been acquired by the War Office, and experiments and trials ave been conducted in St. Petersburg for several weeks with such success that the general staff expects important results from its new panoramograph squad in establishing Japanese pesitions and movements. The apparatus is said to be capable of photographing an area of thirty square miles.

With Oku's Army.

Gen. Oku's Headquarters, May 19.—The railway has been completed and is operating as far as Tiellng, temporary bridges replacing those that were destroyed. Work is rapidly pushing north of Tieling, and material for permanent bridges is arriving from Japan. for several weeks with such succes

Provisions For Russ Fleet.
Hong Kong, May 19.—A special correspondent who recently proceeded from here to Kwangecheu Bay (Leichau Peninsula, north of the Island of Hainan), observed at 11 o'clock at night, May 16, 150 deeply laden junks, presumably loaded with provisions for the Russian fleet.

Germany's Official Denial.

Tokio, May 19.—The Foreign Office yesterday announced the receipt of a communication from the German Government, pronouncing utterly unfound-

ernment, pronouncing utterly unfound ed the reports of the occupation of Hai-chou. The rumors of the German oc-cupation of Haichou were never entire-ly credited here, but their disyowal was received with satisfaction.

Ottawa, May 19.—Rev. Father Jolleur, of St. Catherines, Quebec, who runs a 17-mile telephone line in Port Neuf County, was examined before the special committee on telephones yesterday. The poles were hauled by the farmers in the winter, free, and for this they got a frank for two years to send messages. There were fourteen subscribers. The line showed a revenue of \$150 last year. The expense was \$100. The line had interchanging privileges with the Bell Co.

Mr. C. F. Sise was again examined. Humane Officer James McGregor has his eyes open these days for men who are abusing their horses, and it s expected some interesting develop-

who are abusing their horses, and it is expected some interesting developments will come up in the Police Court soon.

"I have several cases of lame horses that I am watching," said Mr. McGregor to The Planet, "and if the first warning does no good I shall have the offenders in the Police Court, no matter who they are. The case I had in the County Court has served as a good example for these offenders, but if one example is not effectual I can provide many more. "It would surprise you to know how many people come into town, tie their horses up on the street at ten o'clock and leave them there until they are ready to go home in the afternoon. In the meantime they walk around town and have their dinners, and expect the poor animals to stand all day in the one place, no matter whether it is hot or cold, with nothing whatever to eat.

"The remedy I have been applying to these cases is to put the horses in a stable and make the owner pay the charges, but this is too simple. If

I miss the horse, the animal gets nothing to eat, and if I find him I am making a good hostler for the owners of the animals. Some people cannot take a hint, and often I put the same horse in for two or more Saturdays in succession. From this time out the first offense will be the last, as the East Kent License Commissioners say, and the offenders from this time forward will be prosecuted. The Whitney Government is making the hotel men keep the law, and I am goint to follow its example and make the teamsters keep the law. Two lame horses were laid up this week, but in the next case the owners will be laid up."


Stricken in Pariament.
